Narbonne Star One of Three L. A. City Players to Win Honor

"Los Angeles had to look to little Narbonne high for its star ball-handler this season and Warren Haslam fully deserves the honor." So declares Charles Curtis, Los Angeles Times sports writer, in his story Sunday announcing The Times' 1936 All-Southern California high school team.

"Passing, running, blocking or tackling" Haslam is a one-man team and every item in his repertoire is executed with brilliance and dashing fire," the sports writer stated. Named with the Gaucho star for the other halfback honor was Del Jones of Valencia high who won this praise: "Then there is Orange county's nominee, heralded for the second year as the greatest player in that area, Del Jones of Valencia. Playing in a small-school sector he still compared with any triple-threat in sight."

Mild Winter Makes For More, Cheaper Christmas Trees

Buyers of Christmas trees this year may benefit from the unusually mild weather, prevailing in the high ranges of California, according to State Forester M. B. Pratt. For the first time in many years it is possible in December to go into the highest mountain areas to cut silver firs. Ordinarily, he said, the trees would be gathered before Thanksgiving and placed in cold storage until Christmas marketing opened.

This condition is resulting in a generous supply of better quality trees and should result in lower prices, he said.

S. P. TO SPEND \$16,500,000 ON NEW EQUIPMENT

Bringing its total appropriations for new and modernized cars and locomotives in 1936 to more than \$41,000,000, Southern Pacific has authorized new expenditures of over \$16,500,000 for the construction and rebuilding of passenger, freight and motive power equipment.

The latest authorization for rolling stock will add 28 new locomotives, 2,725 new freight cars and 41 modern, lightweight passenger cars to the service of the public, at a cost of nearly \$15,000,000.

Air-conditioning and modernization of passenger train equipment, which already has covered all of the company's principal trains, will be carried on at a cost of \$1,200,000, according to the announcement. In addition to the \$41,000,000 for rolling stock, Southern Pacific has appropriated \$5,890,000 this year for rails and track accessories alone.
