**"Learning for Ladies" Exhibit on View at Huntington Library**

Ghosts of learned ladies are stalking the galleries of the Huntington library at San Marino. Fair progenitors of the modern lady scholar, who have waged a war of words since the time of Columbus to achieve educational opportunities equal with those of men, are on parade. Their thrusts and victories are recounted in a small exhibit of books entitled, "Learning for Ladies." The rare little volumes will be on view thru February.

Treatises by early European feminists, like Mary Wollstonecraft, who, in 1792, in her memorable "Vindication of the Rights of Women," pleaded for the social, political, and intellectual enfranchisement of women, are shown in the Huntington library exhibition.

**Great American Women**  
American pioneers in the struggle worthy of remembrance are also represented in the exhibition: Emma Willard, who urged the legislature of New York in 1819 to appropriate funds for a female seminary which should provide more than a superficial education; Mary Lyon, who founded, just 100 years ago, Mount Holyoke Female Seminary; Catharine Beecher, who prepared the ground for subsequent development of domestic science as an important phase in the education of young women; and Elizabeth Blackwell, who, in 1848, at last succeeded in obtaining an M. D., and thereby became the first woman physician in modern times.

Dr. Merle Curti, professor of history at Smith College, and an associate member of the research staff of the Huntington library, says in the hand list of the exhibition that the provision for educational opportunities for women has been "one of America's greatest contributions in the age-long contest for human rights."

**Paris Styles**

PARIS. (U.P.)—The Schiaparelli mid-season collection goes in for bright colors and a slim, short-skirted, youthful silhouette. Daytime clothes are tailored and simple, while evening clothes, shown in a variety of colors, are brightened by gold embroidery, much beading and bright spangles.

Hats are even taller. Many of them are patterned after a miner's cap with a straight, short visor in front and a high, full crown that is slightly crushed. There are several variations of the halo hat, worn well back on the head, with a broad front brim jutting back from the forehead.

The new "avoid the sun" beach clothes for resort wear are most amusing. Bright pink corduroy shorts are worn with a short-sleeved navy blue sweater and the beach hat looks just like a little jockey cap, of pink corduroy.

To protect every part of the skin from exposure to the sun, Schiaparelli uses long cotton knit gloves that reach up above the elbow, and long leggings of the same cotton knit. A silk veil of navy blue can be pulled down over the face. This is made just like a mask, with small slits for the eyes.

A similar costume is made with robin's egg blue corduroy shorts that fall down to the knees. A light blue corduroy cap, mask, long cotton gloves and leggings also accompany this outfit. Thus, the person with a delicate skin that reddens, blisters and peels isn't prevented from going to the beach.
