AT THE LIBRARY

"People, People Everywhere" by Bob Davis: Is a big book of juicy anecdotes from all parts of the world and of good stories from Nova Scotia to Yucatan. Originally the material appeared in the New York Sun on the editorial page. The editor writes in a breezy way with a love for the peculiarities of people and a joy in wandering over the world. There are adventures with famous people in famous places and adventures with extraordinary people who have hidden themselves away in odd corners of the world. It is full of life and good journalism.

New fiction arrivals are: "I Have Four Apples" by Josephine Lawrence: A realistic novel of realistic people.  
"White Banners" by Lloyd C. Douglas: That popular author of Magnificent Obsession and Green Light.

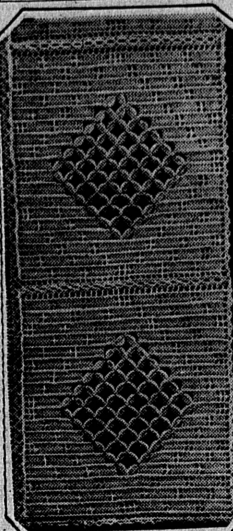
"Second Growth" by Arthur Pound: This story of the Michigan scene bridges the years from the first small pioneer industries to throbbing manufacturing centers of boom years. Lusty Captain John Mark and his sons and daughters see their world change almost overnight, find themselves torn from the old peaceful ways, and flung into the maelstrom to face sudden wealth, sudden poverty. It is a story of spiritual and material growth, with American scene at its most changing period.

"I Met a Gypsy" by Norah Lofts: This new and suave writer seems to say to us that once you have dash of gypsy blood in the family, descendants thru five generations will exhibit strange and exciting traits. This is an extremely readable novel, though in the chain of episodes it is natural that some should appeal to any particular reader more than others. In the brief, and rapidly moving treatment many of the scenes stand out with the clearness and sharpness of a silhouette. Very entertaining.

"El Jimmy" by Herbert Childs: is the sensational life story of an Englishman who could out-ride and outshoot any gaucho in all of wild and windswept Patagonia. Circumstances, mostly of his own doing, tangled Jimmy Radbone so he had spent 40 years in Patagonia, part of the time a fugitive. He owns a sizeable estancia, married a Tehelque, and has a family of husky children. The author traveled 10,000 miles to get the first hand story of this amazing character, and lived with him in the world's last frontier. One of the critics of the book, C. J. Fluger, declares the incidents related to be authentic no matter how improbable they seem, for he too when young, rode, hunted and raced horses with El Jimmy.

By the way, Fluger himself has one very enjoyable tale of Patagonia, "Seven Horizons." There is a fascination in reading of that wild, half fabulous country which Fluger characterized as, "A good land, with good companions possessed of fine elemental qualities of courage and fidelity."
