

Baby Cared for By Local Mexicans Returned to Mother After Probe

The mystery of the abandoned baby, which involved a local Mexican family in a Redondo Beach investigation for the past two weeks, was solved late last week.

Found on the night of Dec. 5 in the automobile of Cerillo Martinez, of Torrance, when arrested for drunk driving, and later taken to the Los Angeles Children's Home Society pending

solution of the mystery, a three-year-old girl was identified to the satisfaction of Redondo police last week as Dorothy Dow, daughter of Mrs. Jessie Dow, of 1740 1/2 East 60th street, Los Angeles.

Martinez told the police the baby was left at his home by an unknown woman and that he and his wife took pity on the child and cared for her along

with their own family of children.

Another Claims Child
A searching investigation was conducted by Redondo police and county juvenile authorities, resulting in the conclusion that Mrs. Dow was the rightful mother, and the child was returned to her.

Mrs. Dow said she had two other children, and being unable to obtain county welfare, for some reason or other, left the baby with the Martinez couple, expecting to reclaim it after she found steady employment.

A double dose of mystery was injected into the case when a

woman, who gave her name and address as Mrs. R. Plumley, 606 East Kensington road, Los Angeles, came to the Redondo police station and said that she had taken care of the child for six months in her home, and that the baby's mother was Irene Carmen, of 1362 East 62nd street, Los Angeles. She produced a picture, claimed to be that of the baby, taken when 13 months of age.

Tale Not Unusual
She further stated that she had been to the Children's Home Society and had identified the child by marks on its body.

Later it was revealed that the

baby had no distinguishing marks, and the authorities completely discounted Mrs. Plumley's story. They advanced no reason, however, as to why she should be interested in the child.

Officials of the Children's Home Society, however, were reported as having said that often women without children come to the home seeking a baby by claiming to have at some time or other cared for the child.

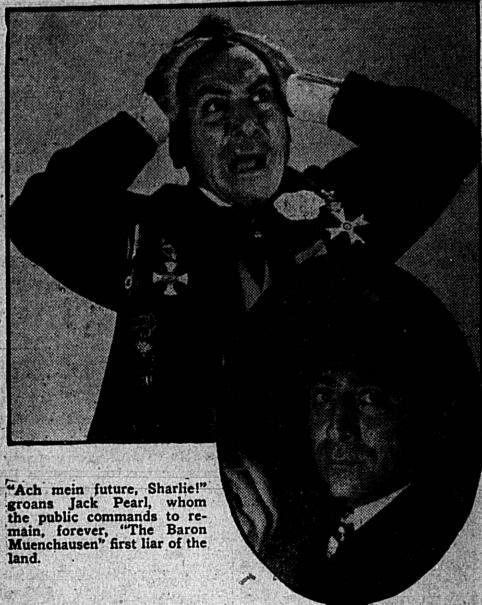
ENTERTAINMENT STARS TYPED by Public Demand

JIMMY CAGNEY, according to Hollywood insiders, would love not being a tough guy, at least just once. If Charlie Chaplin discarded his familiar dented derby, the public would, they say, give us a story almost as old as the theatre itself.

The public insists on typing its amusement favorites. There's the case, for instance, of Jack Pearl, the comedian,

whose catch-phrase catches on, for no particular reason. This sort of thing went on for a long time. The Baron reigned long as one of the air's favorites, and people continued to ask if Sharlie was dere. At one time the comic decided that it was time to bury the Baron, and he bobbed up in a new radio venture as Peter Pfister, inn-keeper and central figure of a comedy drama. Pearl found, in short order, that he couldn't just snap his fingers, do away with the Baron and become
