## Paris Styles

PARIS. (U.P.)—Woolen evening gowns are no longer a novelty in Paris and are worn by the smartest women, particularly for winter sports trips into the mountains where houses and hotels are not too warmly heated.

Captain Molyneux makes one of these practical gowns in black jersey of a very fine weave. The dress is classical in style with a fitted silhouette that moulds the figure closely to below the hips, then flares outward to the floor. The broad shoulder straps also are of jersey in a soft sand shade and the gown is completed by a long sand colored scarf that is twisted loosely about the neck, then falls in streamers to the knees.

Molyneux introduces bright shades into his mid-season collection. An attractive evening gown in coral colored crepe likewise is made on simple, classic lines. The only trimming on this gown is a working of coral colored silk cord at the decollete neckline. The cord is stitched on in a looped pattern to follow the cut away neck line.

Periwinkle blue is used for a third evening gown in crepe that is trimmed with composition buttons of the same shade. The bodice is banked with bunches of violets at the end of the squared decollete. Narrow shoulder straps support the gown in back, while the waist is encircled by a sash that ties into a bow and streamers that fall loosely down the back.

## Beauty and Brains and Art Too Combine in Rose Bampton; She Will Be Philharmonic Soloist



ROSE BAMPTON, lovely American-born and trained singer who will be first soloist of the New Year with Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, Jan. 7-8, Klemperer conducting.

The first Los Angeles Philharmonic orchestra pair of concerts in the New Year will fall on Jan. 7-8 at Philharmonic Auditorium and will introduce Rose Bampton, lovely, Metropolitan Opera contralto, as soloist. Beautiful to look at, charming to know is this distinguished artist who during the past few years has climbed to top ratings as an artist both here and in Europe.

Still in her early twenties, Miss Bampton is said to be a girl with many sides to her life. For instance she adores dancing and to this practice she attributes that lovely poise for which she is famous. Tennis and horseback riding, at one extreme; at the other cooking and even dressmaking are reported to be her delights.

Otto Klemperer, who will conduct the concert, has provided a magnificent program with a first performance for the Southland. These offerings, together with the wide acclaim and the personal popularity of the singer, are expected to crowd the Auditorium. The program includes the Fourth Symphony of Jan Sibelius, the Finnish composer (first performance in the West), "Zampa" by the singer, "Forza Del Destino," Miss Bampton; intermission followed by "When I am Laid in Earth" from Purcell's "Dido and Aeneas," and two Richard Strauss songs, "Fingerring" and "Casselle," by the singer.

Upon telegraphic request of Klemperer the singer has consented to do another number at the close, the orchestra playing Wagner's "Prelude and Love Death" from Tristan and the singer doing the lovely "Liebestod."
