County Poultry Industry Gains

Disease Control Work Interests Ranners
The marked increase in the number of poultry rangers and stimulation of interest in disease control work has been reflected in the increased number of visitors to the county poultry demonstration plant at Pomona, according to the annual report of Dr. L. M. Hurt, county livestock inspector. Poultrymen have taken a renewed interest in the value of the poultry plant since its reopening last April. It had been closed since December 1934. The principal experiment was made with 1,000 wide leghorn chickens, divided into 10 lots of 100 each. They were fed rations varying markedly in fiber content, using wheat bran, chopped alfalfa hay and barley as sources of fiber. Birds that were fed rations containing more than 20 percent bran or six percent chopped alfalfa hay have shown a definite lack of pigment color and varied noticeably in size. Most Favorable Year
Approximately 28 percent more chicks were hatched and brooded in Los Angeles county this spring than last year, the report stated. A large proportion of the increase was in the heavy breeds. Losses, especially in the hands of the inexperienced, were heavier than usual. There has been an increased tendency among breeders to install incubators and operate their plants as complete production units. Dr. Hurt said that the fiscal year ending last June 30 was the most favorable for the poultry industry of the county since

Fund to Study Beach Erosion Sought by Ford

Changes in the scope of the flood control act to permit expenditure of flood control funds for a study of beach erosion were being prepared this week by the county counsel, at the request of the board of supervisors. The action was taken on motion of Supervisor Leland M. Ford of Santa Monica, who has 97 percent of the county's beach frontage in his Fourth district, from the Ventura county line to Long Beach. The 1937 legislature will be asked to make the necessary changes requested by the recently-elected beach city supervisor.

Act Limits Work

"Under the present flood control act, we are limited by the things we can do, and among those things is the spending of money to study the erosion along the beach," the Santa Monica supervisor said. "We also are limited in the amount of money we can spend in repairing floods in areas except in those actually owned by the county. Inasmuch as I have all of the beach cities, I want that act amended so that it will permit us to spend money for the study of beach erosion. That has to do, of course, with our harbor filling up, and the shifting of sands, and the study of the tides and currents, and also with reference to the protection of those particular areas."

Green Bay Packers.
Minnesota and Northwestern Biggest Upsets of Year

Mighty Minnesota, unbeaten in three years and with a winning streak of 21 straight games, crashed in Oct. 31 before an inspired Northwestern team, 6-0. The Gophers had previously beaten Washington, which went on to win the Pacific Coast title. Northwestern kept up the pace, won the Big Ten title and came down to its final game against Notre Dame with the national title in its grasp. The Irish, laced by Pitt and Navy, reached their peak in late November and smacked the Wildcats, 26-6.

Packers Win National Pro Title Before \$8,000

The Green Bay Packers, the big team from the little town, captured the world's professional football title by conquering the Boston Redskins in the East-West playoff game, 21-6, before a crowd of 29,546 at the Polo Grounds, New York. Arnold Herber, a native son of Green Bay, wrecked Boston's sturdy defense with his bull's-eye passes.

The Packers lost only one game during the regular season—to the Chicago Bears, 30-3. After that loss they fought their way to the Western title, smothering the Bears, 21-10, in their drive. Boston staged a cyclonic finish to win the Eastern title and wound up the season without a home because of poor support by the Boston fans.

ROSE BOWL JINX FACES BOTH RIVALS; PITT 3 DOWN; HUSKIES 1 TIE, 1 DEFEAT

Pittsburgh's mighty Panthers and the Huskies of Washington clash in the 20th annual tournament of roses football game Friday—with each seeking to score the first victory in the huge Pasadena bowl.

Both elevens—Washington, the champion of the Pacific Coast, and Pittsburgh, which was voted the outstanding eastern team of 1936—have been defeated this season. Neither has a claim on the national title. So the only "angle" to the game is that the winner finally will crash the Rose Bowl victory column.

Washington played first in Pasadena in 1926 when it was whipped by Alabama, 20-19. In 1924, the Huskies played a 14-14 deadlock with Navy. Pittsburgh, playing in Pasadena for the fourth time, has the dullest record of any team ever to represent the east.

Pitt Trounced Badly Twice
The Panther's best stand was their first—in 1926 when they lost only 7-6 to Stanford. In 1930, Pittsburgh came west with nine straight victories but that skein was snapped 47-14 by University of Southern California. Three years later the Trojans again pummeled the Panthers, 35-0, for the worst beating any team has taken in the bowl.

Despite their previous records, these giants are expected to wage one of the most savage games in the history of the series. And, despite criticism for inviting Pittsburgh over Louisiana State a sell-out crowd of 75,000 is expected to see the game.

Pittsburgh's record is marred by a scoreless tie with Fordham and a 7-0 upset defeat by Duquesne. Washington started the season with a 14-7 licking by Minnesota. Later Washington's record was soiled further when Stanford held it to a 14-14 tie.

But in their last game, the Huskies rose to the heights with a 40-0 triumph over Washington State—a victory that gave them the coast title and the bowl bid, for Washington State could have taken the honors by winning.

Both Played Nine Games
Each team has played nine games with Pittsburgh's record slightly the better. The Panthers' victims include Notre Dame, which toppled mighty Northwestern; Nebraska, which almost whipped Minnesota, and

Face Every Experience
The series of tests, May's letter continues, has been scientifically developed at the Harvard Bureau of Street Traffic Research and by Profs. May and Stoekel of Yale. "Those taking part in the tests, alho engaged in a serious undertaking, really have a most interesting time. They actually experience the driving of a car at a high speed along a winding road without any of the danger or discomfort which usually accompanies such a trip. During this trip of approximately 200 feet, the driver is faced with every conceivable experience and condition that could possibly happen while actually on the open highway; he will be shown how to cope with every one of them and in this way be made to feel a part of this great task of cutting down the toll."
