

Bible Sales Increase NEW ORLEANS, (U.P.)—An increase in the sale of Bibles in Louisiana has been reported. Since January 1, 32,808 volumes have been distributed. This includes 1,297 Bibles, 2,743 testaments, 28,736 parts of the Bible. It is an increase of 1,024 Bibles, 1,358 testaments and 2,448 parts of the Bible over the same period last year.

New Projects Open Tues. In Harbor District

East San Pedro and Wilmington Work Starts Under SERA Orders

Two new SERA projects, one in East San Pedro, and the other in Wilmington, were scheduled to open Tuesday morning, July 24, in the drive of the relief organization to increase workers on the Los Angeles county payroll to 50,000. In East San Pedro, Barracuda street from Cannery street to Terminal Way is to be graded and paved and in Wilmington, Pier A street is to be paved. For both projects, the SERA payroll is estimated at \$4394, and the average weekly shifts for both jobs is expected to be 80 men for a period of 20 days.

Details of the jobs are: Barracuda street: Grading and paving with five-inch oiled decomposed granite from Cannery street to Terminal Way, SERA labor estimated at \$2,565, 22 men on each of two shifts a week, work to last 22 days, total cost of project \$3,944.

Pier A street: Paving additional width with three-inch decomposed granite, SERA payroll estimated at \$1,829, cost to the county road department \$1,264, total cost of project \$3,093, 22 men on each of two shifts a week, and work to continue for 18 days.
