

Lower Taxes On Automobiles Under New Law

New State Tax Based On Flat Rate of the Valuation

Automobile taxes of persons residing in most of the incorporated cities of Los Angeles county will be less under the new Riley-Martin state tax, while for persons in unincorporated areas it will be higher, County Auditor H. A. Payne explained Tuesday.

The new state tax which abolishes the county personal property tax on automobiles, will be based on a flat rate of \$1.75 per \$100 valuation.

The valuation will be the current Blue Book rating.

The discrepancy in the city and county rates under the new law, Payne explained, will result from the fact that the Blue Book values in most cases are more than twice the present assessed valuations, while the \$1.75 is about one-third of the average tax rates paid by residents of cities in the county, but slightly higher than rates in unincorporated territories.

Under the new setup, the county will lose approximately \$3,000,000 in annual revenue. The state will return 25 percent of automobile tax collections to the cities and 12 1/2 percent to counties, which will net Los Angeles county an estimated \$700,000 annually, as compared with \$4,000,000 collected this year under the personal property tax.

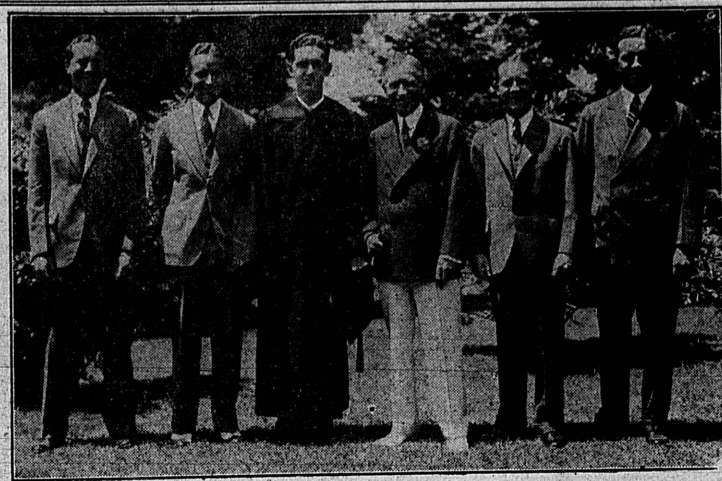

Five Firestone Sons Are Princeton Graduates

PRINCETON, N. J.—Mr. and Mrs. Harvey S. Firestone and their four oldest sons, who are all alumni of Princeton University, were present here at the graduation of their fifth and youngest son Roger, last week.

To have five sons receive degrees from a university such as Princeton is a most unusual event and Mr. and Mrs. Firestone appeared particularly happy on this occasion. The eldest son, Harvey, Jr., was graduated in the class of 1920; Russell, in 1924; Leonard, in 1931; Raymond, in 1933; and Roger, this year.

Roger in his junior year won the unusual honor of being elected to membership in Sigma Xi, national honorary scientific society, and this year at a meeting of the American Physical Society in Washington there was presented a scientific paper in original research of which he was the co-author. For the past two years he was coxswain of the varsity crew.

At the class day exercises last week he was awarded the Biddle Medal "for good sportsmanship."

"Aside from their scholastic records it is especially gratifying to me to know how well their classmates thought of my sons," Mr. Firestone said. "Roger was the fourth to be voted by his class as 'the man most likely to succeed.' I am happy to say that our four older sons are associated with me in the Firestone enterprises and that Roger, after certain post graduate work will join them with me."

PHILADELPHIA, (U.P.)—Engineering plans for 22 two-car streamlined trains to be built in France are being drafted by the Edward G. Budd Manufacturing Company.

The trains, to cost approximately \$1,200,000, will be constructed by the State Railways of France, which has been licensed to use the Budd Process of fabricating stainless steel.

Officials said the trains will incorporate the best features of Zephyr models and the Flying Yankee built in the United States.

Work of drawing the engineering plans is expected to continue for two months.

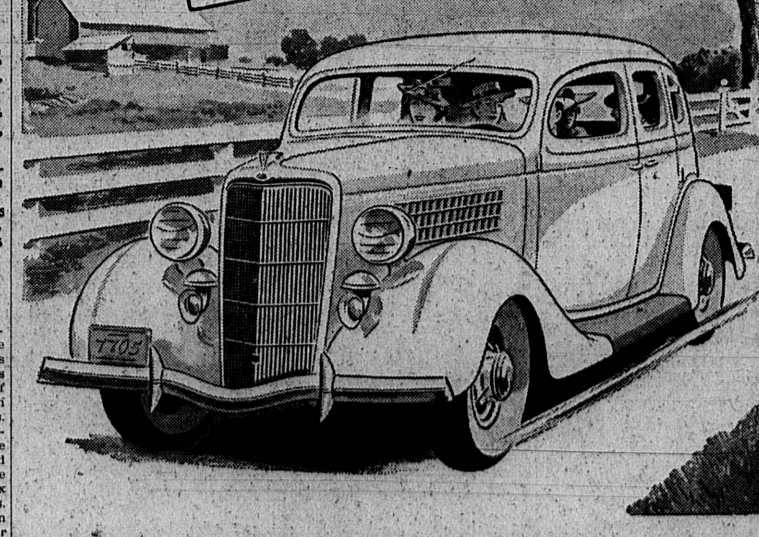
