## Thousands View New Postoffice Last Saturday

Visitors Stream Through New Building Till Closing Time at 9 P. M.

More than 2,000 people attended the opening ceremonies held Saturday afternoon to launch the new Torrance post-office building, and visited the premises throughout the afternoon and until closing time at 9 o'clock. As this afforded the first and last time for a thorough inspection of the building from top to bottom, throngs of visitors passed thru the rooms during the six hours, and admired the spacious, convenient quarters with their handsome fittings and decorations.

Postmaster C. Earl Conner and his staff were disappointed over the non-arrival of the new fixtures, which are coming in slowly, and were not in place for the opening inspection. The program, sponsored by the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, began promptly at 3 p. m. Congressman Charles J. Colden, whose efforts were largely responsible for the speedy passage of the Congressional appropriation, was introduced by Postmaster Henry Briggs of Los Angeles, and made a brief but effective talk, complimenting the people of Torrance on their enterprise in securing such a fine addition to the downtown section.

Postmasters from many adjacent communities were among the visitors. Local friends of the postmaster and his staff sent beautiful baskets of flowers. The Torrance Symphonic orchestra played during the afternoon program.

Lunch was served to all visitors from 3 to 9 o'clock. On Sunday all stock and equipment required were moved from the old building to the new and on Monday morning the new postoffice went into service.
