### "Separate Maintenance" Threat Is Not Taken Seriously By Board

Los Angeles city council's threat to form a separate city and county, voiced Wednesday, was not taken seriously by Los Angeles county officials today, but is looked upon as an attempt to "jar loose" gasoline tax funds being withheld from the city by Supervisor John Anson Ford.

While Supervisor Ford still stood his ground today, with dirt and rubbish in the streets of Hollywood and downtown Los Angeles becoming more of a health menace daily, the county road department expected to hear from the other 44 cities of the county with requests for gasoline tax funds to sweep their streets. Opinion of the county council's office that has tax funds might now legally be used to sweep streets, as Los Angeles city has contended, has "opened the doors" to the other 44 cities, some contended.

This city and the others in the county is probably entitled to ask for and to get gasoline tax funds for street cleaning purposes as is Los Angeles, it was said. Street sweeping is not the problem in a small community, however, that it is in the heart of a metropolitan city. Fortunately, the week-end rainfall came without a sudden downpour, and rubbish in the gutters was washed away without clogging any storm drains and flooding business houses.

Proposal of Los Angeles city to form its own county was made by Councilman James Hyde of Hollywood. A few minutes before, Councilman Edward Thrasher of Eagle Rock, had caused a motion to be adopted to instruct the city attorney to prepare an initiative or ordinance "to prohibit the supervisors from imposing double taxes on property owners of incorporated areas, including every city in the county."

Thrasher cited as examples the forestry departments of the county, and the city of Los Angeles, the planning, health, road, flood control, parks and playgrounds, board of education, farm advisor and others. These departments are maintained out of the general county tax rate, which applies to incorporated and unincorporated areas alike.

### Red Cross Drive In Torrance Is Well Under Way

#### Many Renewals and New Memberships Are Being Received

Roll call workers in Torrance of the Red Cross began enrolling members Monday, November 11, and will continue until the local chapter's quota is reached. Mrs. Flora Waters, local chairman, says the volunteers now mobilized for this effort expect to quickly achieve the mark. The membership campaign will be brought to a close officially on Thanksgiving Day.

In addition to presenting the special projects for first aid stations on the highways and the accident prevention program in the home and on the farm, Roll Call volunteers are telling the public about the work of Red Cross nurses in public health activities. Mrs. Waters said: "A picture of a Red Cross nurse appears on the Roll Call poster again this year. The nurse who has a right to wear

the Red Cross uniform may give service in any one of three distinct and highly valuable services.

"She may be enrolled in the active reserve of nurses who could be called on by the Red Cross of the government for duty in war, epidemic of disease, or any other widespread emergency. There are 38,000 nurses on the active list of the Red Cross Nurses' Reserve.

"She may be one of the 768 Red Cross public health nurses, a heroic band of women who handle bedside nursing cases and assist the local health authorities and the school doctors, principally in rural communities. Last year these nurses made 1,156,003 nursing visits to or in behalf of patients. They inspected 633,944 children in schools.

"Or this Red Cross nurse may be one of the 1,593 authorized instructors who last year conducted 4,374 classes in home hygiene and care of the sick, teaching men and women, boys and girls the elementary principles of prevention and cure of disease."

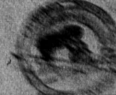
