

Filipinos Sail For the Islands

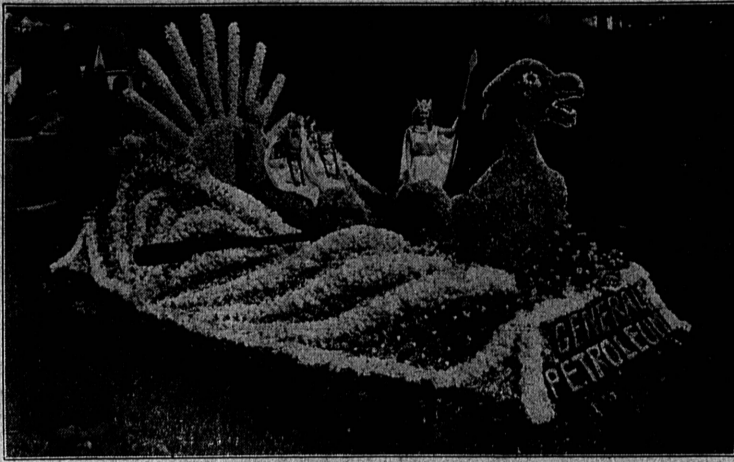
