### State Officials

Approve Plans For Administration Building Offered As Federal Project

Favorable action by district and state PWA officials have advanced the plans for a new administration building in the city of Torrance to a new stage, according to advices received by city officials this week, says Mayor W. H. Stanger. The project is now in Washington for the approval of officials there.

Word was received yesterday that the second project offered by the city of Torrance, the rebuilding of the fire hall to conform to the architecture of the new civic buildings, has also been approved here and forwarded to Washington.

Action by the PWA officials however does not commit the city to acceptance of the offer, which will be considered from all angles before final action is taken.

### Ford Grateful For Support

Supervisor Leland M. Ford Is Given Great Vote; Reaves Wins By Small Margin

By the slim margin of 226 votes, Congressman Charles J. Colden secured the Democratic nomination for Representative from the 17th district Tuesday over his nearest opponent, Lee E. Geyer, backed by the Townsend Club forces. Colden's total vote in 417 out of 418 precincts was 15,408, Geyer 15,182.

Rumors that Geyer will ask for a recount of the ballots have not been officially confirmed.

Opposition to Colden was divided between Geyer and A. P. (Tony) Entenza, who polled 7,731 votes, in a campaign that was waged intensively throughout the district.

Assemblyman Fred Reaves won out in the 68th district by 186 votes over John T. Rawls. Reaves polled a total of 3,658 in 101 out of 102 precincts. Rawls' supporters numbered 3,472, with Haskell Tidwell, former secretary to Congressman Colden third with 2,277, and Chaffee fourth with 968.

Supervisor Leland M. Ford received a great vote of confidence from the people of the Fourth district, who gave him 51,150 votes in 827 out of 828 precincts. Ford's total exceeded that polled by all other 14 candidates.

William R. Barciay, city engineer of Hawthorne, surprised by running second to Ford with 7,289. David J. Williams, Beyerly Hills, was third with 5,986, and Paul H. Jarrett, city clerk of Culver City fourth with 5,887.

Dr. A. C. Van Velzer of Gardena finished in sixth place with 4,650.

The big surprise of the primary was the showing made by Harlan G. Palmer, publisher of the Hollywood Citizen News, who polled 137,188 votes to take second place against Buron Fitts, 208,034, and will make the race against the incumbent district attorney at the regular election in November.
