#### Powerful Northern Squad Is Expected to Give the Tartars a Battle

One of the hardest-fought gridiron tilts in this section will be waged at Compton on Friday, when Gordon Clark's Compton Junior College varsity eleven clashes with the powerful Fresno State College frosh in a nocturnal encounter. The kick-off for the Tartar-Bullpup game will take place at 7:45 p. m. A capacity crowd of 6,500 people is expected to witness the contest.

Having uncovered a new half-back and a new right end, the Compton eleven will be a greatly improved team and is conceded a slight edge. The two Tartar pigskin carriers, Zip Kennedy and David Mushkain, will again alternate at the quarterback and fullback posts, which they did so effectively against Riverside last week.

The Bullpups have one of the strongest eleven in years and the largest squad in history. The Fresno fans are confident that their freshman squad will put up a great fight and may give the Tartars a big surprise. Last year the Fresno team held the Tartars to a slim 8-6 victory.

### Lions and the Gaels Will Whale Each Other Sunday Afternoon

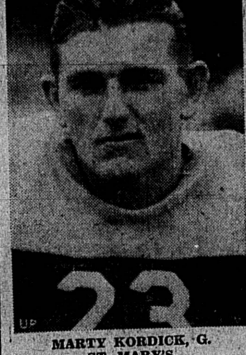
LOS ANGELES.—Two of the strongest "major independents" on the Pacific coast will clash next Sunday afternoon, Oct. 11, in the coliseum when Coach Slip Madigan and his St. Mary's Gaels tangle with Coach Tom Lieb's Loyola Lions.

It will be the first time in history that the two teams meet with the colorful Gaels matching man-power and strength against the speed and deceptiveness of the Lions.

Barring injuries from the California game, Coach Madigan will send his full strength against Loyola. At ends will probably be John Giannoni and Jim Austin. Tackles will be Jerry Dennerlain and Bill Wilkin; at guard will be Mart Kordick and John Conlee. At the pivot position will be Wally Gardard.

In the backfield some of the boys who will see plenty of action will be Louis Perry at quarterback; Lou Rimassa, left half; Les Groux at right half, and Floyd Maxham, who Coach Madigan believes to be the most outstanding back on the coast, at fullback. Maxham is a real triple-threat man.

Coach Tom Lieb will probably have Babe Agamenoni and Tom Wilson at the flanks; Si Dallmeire and Steve Thomas at tackles; Einar Klauson and George Ratkovich at guard, with Bill Rozier at center. 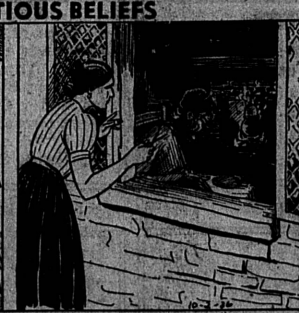

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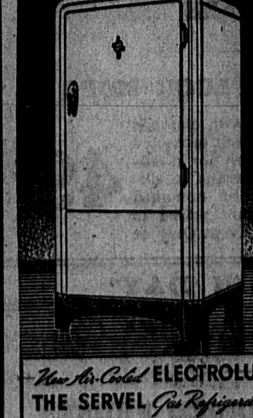
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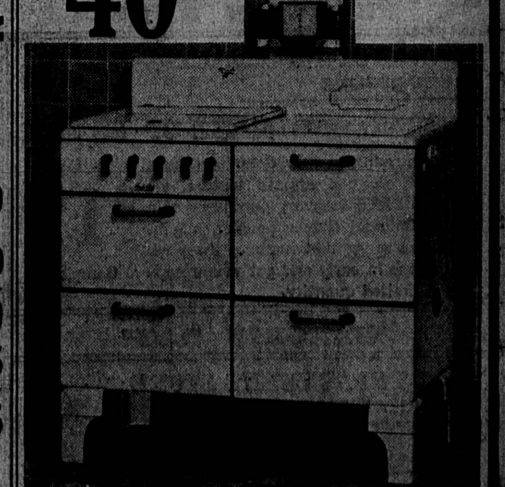
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
