made. No milk dealer or dairy in the district escapes the periodic visit of Mr. Isaacs, who takes samples of their product and brings it to the laboratory where it is tested for a number of things, butter fat, content, purity and dilution.

No chance of getting away with watered milk here, for the test tubes show inexorably the quality of the raw product.

Frequent tests of Torrance water are made, to show the chemical content, and disclose the presence if any of harmful bacteria.
