Will Be Afforded At Low Rate

Group hospitalization, long in operation in eastern cities, will soon become available in Southern California, following the adoption of plans to form an association. These plans were under discussion at a meeting held at the California hospital, Los Angeles, last night. Mrs. Minnie Brooks reperesented the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital of this city, which will probably become affiliated with the association. Plans as now outlined are for the formation of a non-profit corporation to be known as the Associated Hospital Service of Southern California. The association is able to come into being under the provisions of a recent act of the legislature which has legalized the formation of such groups.
