> The original city of Torrance, then, included seven parks, totaling less than ten acres. Annexation of the Meadow Park tract, including Hollywood Riviera, in 1927 provided an eighth park, while the ninth and largest in the system is the newly developed Municipal park.

> A trifle under ten acres in extent, this beautiful rest spot was formerly part of the vast Torrance oil fields. Production there ceased at an early date and three years ago the city acquired the site and began to improve it.

Difficult Problem

THE TASK was not an easy one. The site was overlaid with thousands of tons of oil-soaked sand, rotary mud and the other concomitants of an abandoned oil field. All these had to be removed and replaced with fresh material ere vegetation could be expected. It took six months for this part of the

Meantime, the city's engineering department, under F. R. Leonard, was preparing plans for a modernized development, actual execution of which was intendent William Gascoigne. Towering cypress trees, broad wavy palms, and a myriad of smaller trees, shrubs and bushes were located and prepared for the day when they would be transplanted to their new locations.

In a civic-minded spirit, many of these trees and shrubs were donated by individual citizens and organizations as an everliving memorial to the town they loved.

Preliminary work completed, the huge moving job was undertaken. The new-old trees were set in place, the ground sodded and the entire premises landscaped. Walks were built and a fountain constructed. Barbecue pits and picnic sites were located and a large shell for open-air concerts was erec-
