No "Ward" System

MOST of the beds are placed in separate rooms, with a few two-bed and four-bed rooms. The old "ward" system of many beds in a single room was never permitted in this hospital.

For operations there are a major and minor operating room, with a "lying-in" room for preliminary treatment for prospective mothers.

A fully equipped emergency room, an X-ray room and two solaria, one at each end, complete the major departments.




