Millard Ranch Grows Epicure's Favorite Fungi

ANOTHER unusual product of the soil in Torrance is mushrooms, of which probably 25 per cent of the Los Angeles requirements are supplied by the J. J. Millard Mushroom Ranch on Sepulveda boulevard near Hawthorne avenue.

This is a Torrance industry of comparatively recent development, begun only a few years ago. Millard started it with one mushroom house but has had to triple the number, while the newer houses are much larger than the original one.

Entering one of these houses one waits for his eyes to become accustomed to the darkness. Then he sees racks, three decks high, running the full length of the structure. These contain about six inches of specially prepared compost and manure, from which all the animal matter and heat have


