Everything In Place

SEWERS, paved streets and all public utilities were constructed in advance; alleys which contained all pole lines provided throughout the townsite; ample reservations were made for public parks, an athletic park and for playgrounds; a civic center was designed; upwards of 300,000 trees were planted in streets and windbreaks; and several acres were reserved for public schools to be donated to the public, upon certain conditions as to the character and completeness of the improvements to be erected thereon.
