

BB's Banned By Police Protectors

"We'll have to start confiscating those Christmas BB guns if boys owning them don't stop breaking windows with the lead pellets," Capt. John H. Stroh of the police department said yesterday. He said the police have received a number of complaints about broken-window panes since the holidays.

Stroh pointed out that the city has an ordinance prohibiting boys under 18 years of age from owning or using any firearms and said that this law included BB guns.

GAMBLING BAN CLAMPS DOWN THRUOUT CITY

Los Angeles' county-wide crime suppression drive, directed mainly at gambling and gambling devices, took effect here Monday afternoon when Police Chief G. M. Calder personally informed all possessors of slot machines, raffle boards and what-not to seal up or remove the equipment.

Both the Police Chief and Mayor W. H. Stanger attended the party for police officials and city officers held by Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz to launch the gambling ban. This "crack-down" was directed principally against those forms of gambling known as faro, monte, roulette, lansquinet, fantan, poker, percentage games, seven and a-half, twenty-one, chuck-a-luck, Chinese lottery, coon-can, bingo, tango, slot-machines, pin-ball games, bookmaking and crane machines.

Police chiefs of every city in the county were ready to take any steps necessary to close down the operation of certain games, which Attorney-General U. S. Webb has designated as "gambling," following the meeting called by Sheriff Biscailuz. The sheriff read a communication which he had received from the state attorney-general in which it was explained the sheriff has the power to step inside incorporated cities if ordered to do so by the attorney-general.

Thousands Renewing Car License Plates

Thousands of Southern California motorists displayed bright orange on black 1937 car license plates with the opening of the registration renewal period Jan. 2.

New numbers are being issued at the various district offices of the Department of Motor Vehicles, which is providing service, daily except Sundays, from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. The nearest district office is at the Redondo Beach Chamber of Commerce.

Ad Campaign for Paying Back Taxes Meets Approval

Expenditure of county funds for a campaign to urge owners of tax-delinquent property to pay up their back taxes and thus redeem their property before it is decided to the state was favored today by the board of supervisors.

The board, in adopting a resolution of Chairman Roger W. Jessup, instructed the county county counsel to prepare a legislative amendment to make it "clearly permissible" for county officials in their discretion to use county revenues for such an advertising campaign. Immediate action of the legislature is urged in order that such a campaign may be launched before the April 20 deadline when the 10-payment plan for payment of delinquent taxes will expire. April 20 also is the deadline for payment of second installments on current taxes.

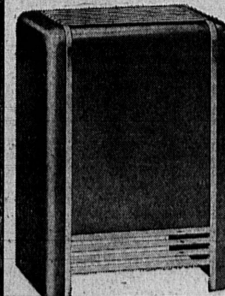
