LINKS MAYANS TO MAORIS

Walterian Studying Strange Peoples

Who were the Mayans whose fabulous temples continue to mystify archeologists and anthropologists prowling in Yucatan, Central America? This question has puzzled researchers for a generation or more since the Yucatan region first gave evidence of being the center of a highly-developed race.

A. Walteria resident, Captain S. Fargo believes that the Maoris, civilized tribesmen of New Zealand, may be related to the mysterious Mayans. He has visited New Zealand and Central America a number of times and has seen resemblances between the living Maoris and the relics of the Mayans which convince him that such a link existed.

Capt. Fargo found the first striking evidence of this theory in the wood carving and statuary of the Maoris. A protruding tongue, a detail noted in the art work of both peoples, was the original clue that sent him, an amateur anthropologist on a search which he has casually followed through the years.

Quotes Old Legends
An old Maori legend, he says, tells how the island people came from a country which is described much like Yucatan. Their legends may also explain Easter Island's strange statuary. Lying some 2,000 miles off the coast of Chile, this island has a great many gigantic stone images, grotesque figures which have remained unsolved by scientists since they were first discovered by white explorers of the lonely, wind-swept spot.

The captain has a set of carved book-ends, fashioned by him from memory of tribal symbols which he saw in New Zealand. Most unusual, however, is their resemblance to Egyptian carvings. This may be explained in a still older Maori legend, Capt. Fargo says, which gives an account of a race migration from Africa to the South Pacific. With theories based in his discoveries, he has spent a great deal of his time studying the symbolism of the ancient peoples.

Continuing Research
The Maoris are classified by anthropologists as aborigines of New Zealand, a Polynesian people with some Melanesian blood. Formerly cannibals, they have become largely civilized and they are said to be the most advanced of the Polynesians in the art of wood-carving.
It has been several years since Capt. Fargo followed his profession of skippering ocean steamers. He is now employed on a tug at San Pedro harbor. He and his wife and daughter are in a snug little home on Neece street in Walteria, where he continues his research work during his leisure hours.

Southland FHA Business Reaches 100 Million Mark

"The total of modernization and repair credit notes insured for lending institutions in the Southern California district and the dollar volume of insured mortgage home financing applications reached the total of \$100,000,000 Dec. 31," according to W. G. Bingham, associate director, Southern California Federal Housing Administration.

"Applications are being received at the rate of 56 per day, totaling approximately a quarter of a million dollars," said Bingham. The volume of Title I loans is expected to increase very materially because, under the terms of the National Housing Act, Mar. 31, 1937, is the last day that such advances of credit will be insured by the FHA.

Two Die in 1936's Final Auto Wreck

Police Blame Excessive Speed for This Careened, Side-swiped, Struck, Turned Turtle and Pinned Young Wife to Her Death

Prolonged blasts from industrial plant whistles as a new year was born also provided a requiem as the 48th automobile accident in Torrance during 1936 snuffed out the lives of two persons near 190th street and Western avenue.

The joyful whistle reception for the 1937 was a somber overtone for the police officers and passers-by as they lifted a smashed and battered coupe from the body of Mrs. Edith M. Lightsey, 29-year-old wife of James C. Lightsey, Columbia steel worker who lives at 4542 169th street, Lawndale.

Her companion on the tragic ride that started out to pick up Lightsey at the end of his shift, Al Palach, 23, of Detroit, Mich., was found dead a short distance from the wreckage. He had been thrown out of the machine after it sideswiped an electric power pole.

Wreck Grim Memorial
The above photo, taken the morning after the accident, graphically shows what was left of the car. The wreckage attracted scores of grave-faced spectators as it stood, a mute symbol of speed-destruction on Mullin's garage grounds. To many it was a grim memorial to the 49 killed, 888 injured in the harbor district during 1936.

While the new year was being ushered in, police officers, left of the car, what was blamed excessive speed as the cause of the fatal deaths. The accident, they learned from witnesses, Ted Lambert, Spurlin court, and Clay Thomas, Los Angeles, occurred about 11:55 p. m. No one knows who was driving the car which was registered to the Lightseys.

Mrs. Lightsey and Mr. Palach, a friend of the family, were believed traveling south on Western avenue. Evidently the driver failed to negotiate the curve at the intersection of 190th because tire marks showed the car left the paved portion of the street 97 feet south of the center line of 190th on the west side of Western. Then the machine careened along the edge of the power pole which sideswiped it 11 feet from the westerly edge of the pavement.

Rites Held Tuesday
It struck a guy wire 46 feet further on in the same direction and turned turtle with the front pointing north. Mrs. Lightsey was pinned underneath. Mr. Palach was dead when Sergeant Schumacher and Officer Haslam arrived at 12:06 a. m., and Mrs. Lightsey succumbed to her injuries about three minutes after being removed from the wreckage.

Mrs. Lightsey was born in Los Angeles and she is survived, in addition to her grief-stricken husband who was a Torrance resident, by about seven years, by her parents and a sister who reside in Gardena. Funeral services were conducted at the Christian church Tuesday afternoon, followed by interment in Roosevelt Memorial park.

The body of Mr. Palach, who is survived by his mother, brother and sister in Detroit, was sent back there for interment Tuesday. He was a close friend of Lightsey for about four years and continued his acquaintance during the two years Mr. and Mrs. Lightsey were married.

Aged Pair Meet Death In Night

Years Only Bond Between Two Torrance Men

In the darkness of the night, last week and this, death came to two aged Torrance residents in widely separated walks of night. Their age was the only thing they had in common.

While Adolph K. Haase, 71 years of age, slept at his home, 5409 182nd street, Wednesday night, he succumbed to a heart attack, according to a report made by Sergeant E. H. Ashton who investigated the death for the police department. The body was removed to Allens' Funeral parlors in Redondo for interment.

Harry Schnaze, 72, came to his end some time Monday night. His lifeless body was found in a cypress grove in the unimproved portion of Western avenue at the edge of a pool of rain water. Mr. Schnaze lived in a shack below the Dominguez Water Company sheds on 218th street for about 15 years.

There were no indications that he met with foul play, according to Officer Fred Sphegner. Mr. Schnaze, a former elephant trainer, toured the nation with circuses in his younger days but of recent years he had been dependent upon charity. The body was removed to Stone and Myers mortuary and efforts are being made to locate relatives.
