Practical Viewpoint

Stressed By Guy M. Hoyt at P. T. A. Meeting

Ninety percent of the youth between the ages of 14 and 20 are in school. They are apportioned to an adult or teacher on the average of 26½ to one. That is why we have in America today a situation that we have never had before. It is indeed the age of youth.

Students feel free to discuss problems and they do not always agree with their instructor. They do pretty much as they please. Parents, who feel sure they control their young folks' every action had better think deeply for in truth they are "kidding" themselves.

Parents should, however, set a good example for youth for we realize that years ago, when the young boy went into the shops it was one youth to ten adults and many times the habits of the elders copied by the

young were far from what was to be desired.

This was a part of the address delivered by Guy M. Hoyt, attendance director of Los Angeles city schools, when he spoke at the high school Parent Teachers Association meeting in the school music room Monday afternoon. Many of the ladies present had heard Hoyt on previous visits to Torrance when he spoke at the coordinating council. He is an authority on all problems concerning modern youth.
