Autobigraphy of John Hays Hammond: This covers 80 years of an adventurous life on four continents, and is recounted by one of the foremost living engineers. An Intimate of the world's great leaders, pioneer in opening America's gold mines and associate of Cecil Rhodes in Africa, he helped extend the frontiers of civilization throughout the world. In the first volume Hammond relates his early years in the West, his entry into South African affairs; his association with Cecil Rhodes; account of the so-called Jameson Raid and his participation makes thrilling reading. The second volume filled with glimpaes of Theodore Roosevelt, Tart, Wil son, etc., follows the uprising and development of American industry from 1900 on.

This cannot be too highly reconnected as most interesting record, a shrewd commentary on the past. Those readers interested in the story of African development and Hammond's vivid account of his participation in the Bogr struggle will find another fine account by an equally remarkable mammajor Frederick Burnham.
