

ZAMPERINI BID TO N. Y. C. INDOOR MEET

Will Compete with Don Lash Fourth Time if Permitted

Louis Zamperini, Torrance high school's greatest contribution to the sports world, America's No. 1 man in the 5,000-meter run in the Berlin Olympic Games and world's intercollegiate mile-run champion, received a wire yesterday inviting him to compete in the annual indoor national

championship 5,000-meter run at Madison Square Garden, New York, Feb. 27.

Although he has not finally decided on accepting the bid, Louis is seriously considering the offer. The crux of the whole matter depends on the University of Southern California authorities. Because the Torrance trackster is enrolled as a freshman at the U. S. C., he must obtain the consent of the university heads before participating in the New York sports event.

Raced Three Times Zamperini, who has smashed the 4:20 mark in the mile run on two occasions since

entering U. S. C. in September, says he is in better shape now than he has ever been in his track career. He is eager to participate in the Madison Square Garden attraction.

If he obtains the U. S. C. permission to attend, he will run against Don Lash, America's greatest long distance runner and holder of the national 5,000-meter run record and the world's two-mile run record, the latter formerly held by Paavo Nurmi of Finland. Louis and Lash have met in three previous events.

The first time these two stellar runners was in the Olympic try-outs in New York. This race ended in a tie and both boys earned a berth on the American Olympic team. The second and third times were in Berlin in the final of the 5,000-meter event and in the British Empire meet in London. Zamperini won both of these races over Lash—both not over the field.

Must Switch Training It is reported that Lash is hoping the Torrance boy can accept the invitation and compete in the New York arena next month, giving him a chance to test his prowess against the Torrance tornado. Lash won a race last week in the east, coming within eight seconds of breaking the world's 3,000-meter run record, held by Nurmi. The Indiana trackster is also reported in better condition now than he was at the time of the Berlin games. Zamperini has been training for the mile run. He must obtain the consent of U. S. C. authorities at once in order to switch his training regime over to get in shape for the three miles, 188 yard grind that is the 5,000 meter jaunt.

Providing he enters, the Madison Square Garden meet would be Zamperini's first essay into indoor track competition.

LOMITA PARK BEING SOUGHT

John Welte Proposes Site on Eshelman Avenue

If the efforts of John W. Welte, Lomita realtor, are successful, that community will have a park. Welte has interviewed Supervisor Leland M. Ford for the Lomita Chamber of Commerce regarding the project and states that the site under consideration is the old Edwards estate of six and one-half acres located on Eshelman avenue. There are a number of other locations that would be suitable, Welte points out. If this estate cannot be obtained, Supervisor Ford and J. R. Wimmer, county forester, have consulted members of the Lomita chamber regarding the proposal. Although no definite step has as yet been taken, Welte says that he would personally back the circulation of a petition in behalf of the move.

"We need the unanimous support of the people of Lomita," Welte said. "We must forget petty bickering and differences among our citizens, and for once have unanimity of effort in a common cause. Then we will have a good chance of getting the park."

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
