Walteria Has Steady Progress NO GROWING PAINS HALT COMMUNITY

Without fanfare or beating of booster drums, Walteria has been going thru considerable development during the past few months. The expansion has been notable because, in addition to being substantial it has not been accompanied by the customary "growing pains" that threaten many a community improvement.

Evidence that Walteria is destined for further growth in the near future was indicated in the recent sale of some 47 building lots, located in various sections of the district, to Mrs. Barbara Urtles and her son, Lyle Urtles, of 17211 Vermont avenue, Gardena.

The sale was made to the Urtles by P. H. Rowland, Lomita realtor and builder, who announced that the deal was closed late last week. Rowland disclosed that the new owners are planning to build several homes and a modern market building in Walteria. The site of the latter business structure has not yet been announced by the landowners but indications are that it will be erected in the vicinity of Roosevelt (101) highway and Hawthorne boulevard.

Tourist Stopping Place
Altho its development has not been rapid, Walteria's growth has been steady, residents in that area said this week. Several new homes have been constructed and it is reported that nearly every available rental is occupied. Walteria has two small markets and a number of other business establishments, and is protected by a Torrance fire department crew, operating out of a sub-station.

The community is becoming one of the major tourist stopping places in the Harbor district, a fact noted by the owner of a cabin court which was built a few months ago. Service stations have also profited by the traffic flow over Roosevelt highway. Walteria has a grade school and is admirably designed for future development, realtors assert.

Recent unannounced of an estate there threw open to subdivision a tract of land northwest of the intersection of Roosevelt and Hawthorne and oil operators are also drilling in the north part of the district.

More Property Deals
R. W. Jones of Omaha, Neb., became the owner of the Rusk auto tourist court at Hawthorne and Sepulveda boulevards this week and Percy F. Perry, who came to Walteria from Nebraska with Jones, purchased an acre of land a block west of the intersection from J. H. Venable. He is building a duplex there.

Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Rusk are moving back to Los Angeles. They own land in that district, however. They purchased the land on which their court stood last May and built shortly afterward. Jones and Perry were two of the hundreds of tourists who stopped with them. Perry says he decided to locate in Walteria after he made a traffic count and found that out-of-state cars were passing through the community at the rate of about 96 per hour. This is 65 percent as many as are recorded for the busiest point on Wilshire boulevard, he states.

MARTHA STREET WILL BE OPENED HERE SOON

By accepting City Engineer Frank Leonard's recommendation, the city council at an adjourned meeting Tuesday night paved the way for the opening—but not paving—of Martha street, southerly to the end of the road in the south part of the city. Leonard reported that Allee street, in the same vicinity, should not be vacated until the consent of all property owners along the route is obtained.
