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## SARDINE SUPPORT ATTACKED

Council Awaits Attorney's Findings

### Lard Cookies

Here are two exceptionally fine cookie recipes. Lard cookies, because they stay moist and keep so well, can be stored in a tight container until they disappear. They are suggested by Inez S. Willson, home economist.

**Holiday Nuggets**  
 2½ cups flour  
 ½ teaspoon baking powder  
 ¼ teaspoon salt  
 ¼ teaspoon cinnamon  
 ¼ cup lard  
 2 eggs, well beaten  
 ¼ cup sugar  
 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
 1½ cups currants  
 1½ cups walnut meats

Sift flour once, then measure, add baking powder, salt and cinnamon, and sift again. Cut the lard into the flour; add the eggs and sugar, and lemon rind. Combine, thoroughly. Add currants and coarsely cut walnuts. Drop from teaspoon on greased baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 12 to 15 minutes.

**Chocolate Nut Bars**  
 ½ cup flour  
 ½ teaspoon salt  
 1 cup sugar  
 ¼ cup lard  
 2 squares chocolate  
 2 eggs  
 ¼ cup chopped nuts  
 1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add salt and sift together. Place lard in a mixing bowl and cream until soft; add warm melted chocolate and stir until thoroughly combined. Beat the whole eggs until very light and fluffy; add sugar, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition; add eggs to chocolate mixture and fold in flour, nuts, and vanilla. Bake in a shallow greased pan for 25 to 30 minutes at 350° F. Cool and cut into squares.

An appeal from the Pacific Coast Fisheries Institute that the city council rescind its endorsement of the initiative measure designed to limit the sardine catch resulted in a discussion at city council meeting Tuesday night that revealed two points. They were:

That Mayor W. H. Stanger is opposed to the council's taking any more "snap action" on state legislative matters, endorsement or objection to initiative or referendum measures when only one side of the case is presented; and, that Councilman George V. Powell is a staunch conservationist, interested in anything that will protect the state's natural resources for future generations.

The Institute's letter, bristling with such phrases as "conspiracy against legitimate business," "lobby front for rapacious interests" and declaring there is no danger of depletion of sardines in California waters, was referred to City Attorney C. T. Rippey. He will make an investigation of both sides to the matter and report his findings to the council later.
