

## KERSEY TAKES L. A. SCHOOL OFFICE FEB. 1

Vierling Kersey, for the past eight years state superintendent of public instruction, will assume the office of the Los Angeles City School districts, Feb. 1. A native of Los Angeles, a product of its schools, a nationally known educator, and one who has successfully conducted state school affairs for many years, Kersey was almost universally considered the logical successor of Dr. Frank A. Bouelle, retiring superintendent.

Dr. Kersey was born in Los Angeles Jan. 28, 1890. He attended the city schools, graduated from Polytechnic high, and graduated from the Los Angeles State Normal School, which later became the University of California at Los Angeles. He attended the University of Southern California, receiving a B. A. degree in 1916. In 1929 Whittier College honored him with the degree of LL. D., and this was followed in 1930 by the honorary degree of Ped. D., conferred on him by the University of Southern California.

He began his teaching career in the Seventh Street Elementary school in January, 1911, and three years later was elected fifth assistant superintendent, which position he held until February, 1929, when he succeeded William J. Cooper as state superintendent.

Dr. Kersey is president of the National Council of State Superintendents and vice president of the National Education association. He is author of various books, pamphlets, and articles on education, vocational education, adult education, and public school finance.

## Mayor to Commend Pastor for Federal Aid in Welfare

At the request of Scott R. Ludlow, city treasurer and former mayor, and with the approval of the city council, Mayor W. H. Rev. Lingenfelter's efforts have long been known to city officials and welfare workers and it is hoped that the warm commendation from the mayor will aid him in obtaining Federal assistance to continue.

his death. He was cheered by the first Paddock family reunion in many years Jan. 3 and rallied, appearing to gain strength under the constant care of his daughters. But 90 years is a handicap to any man and Job Paddock, despite his excellent constitution, was unable to rise from his bed.

The funeral arrangements for Saturday afternoon, 2 o'clock, are being made by A. M. Gamby and the Lomita lodge, No. 644, F. and A. M., of which Mr. Paddock was chaplain for seven terms. The rites will be held at the Gamby chapel in Lomita and at Roosevelt cemetery, with the Masons officiating.

### Honored By Lodge

Mr. Paddock was born in Ohio, Dec. 30, 1846, but spent most of his boyhood in Wisconsin. He was keenly interested all his life in public and community affairs and always took an active part in the development of whatever place he called home. Moving to Minnesota, he married Anna Hansen, who passed away 10 years ago this month. His mother and father came from England. Forty-one years ago the Paddocks moved to California and in 1911 came to Lomita from Riverside, where he was an orange grower.

Then he entered the poultry business and became interested in the culture of avocados. He loved to relate his experiences driving a stage coach in Minnesota and his many friends knew his sterling character from his interest in welfare and humanitarian works. His daughter, Ida May Hisslop, who died in 1917, is still remembered in Lomita as president of the first P. T. A. and Ladies' Aid society and for her activities in developing the community's social life.

On June 27, 1930, Mr. Paddock was presented with a gold pin by his fellow Masons in tribute to his 50 years' active membership in the lodge—a membership that meant living up to all the Masonic tenets to him. He was determined to attend the last installation of officers of his order and although suffering from a cold, was present at the ceremonies last Dec. 29.

Mr. Paddock leaves three sons, Frank A., of San Pedro, John J., of Los Angeles, and Benjamin, of Inglewood; two daughters, Mrs. J. R. Strachan, of Los Angeles, and Miss Birda Paddock, postmaster at Lomita; two grandchildren, Madeline Strachan, and a host of friends throughout Southern California who held him in highest esteem.
