Birthday Ball Raises \$237; 500 Attend

More than 500 Torrance and Gardena folk jammed the Hollywood Riviera clubhouse Saturday night to dance and play cards so that some infantile paralysis victims in the two communities could eventually walk. Attending the fourth annual President's Birthday Ball, they contributed \$237 toward the community and national funds for combatting this dread disease and had a merry time doing it.

Mrs. Harry U. Higgins, general chairman of the event, expressed her thanks to all who made the ball a success and voiced sincere appreciation of the work of scores of volunteer assistants who contributed much of their time during the past few weeks to make arrangements for the ball, held on President Roosevelt's 55th birthday from coast to coast.

Major Share Held Here
A full financial report of Lomita's first observance of the Ball had not been completed this week by Chairman Coy Farquhar but he announced that \$34 had been collected at the door of the Odd Fellow's hall the night of the dance and that \$6 was obtained from sale of refreshments and \$4.50 realized from donations to send a telegram of birthday congratulations to the President. Farquhar will make public the total receipts next week.

Seventy percent of the funds collected here and in Lomita will be earmarked for local use to benefit infantile paralysis sufferers while the remaining 30 percent is to be forwarded to the Georgia Warm Springs foundation for research into the disease on a national scale.

Paris Styles

PARIS (U.P.)—Double duty dresses that serve for street and cocktail wear are the latest innovation of the big Paris dressmakers. It is an indication of the return to practicality that these great designers, who charge a small fortune for a single garment, should create dresses that will serve for two different occasions.

One of the most practical of these costumes is in black broadcloth and taffeta. For street wear, there is a tailored skirt of broadcloth which is worn with a short-sleeved taffeta blouse that is fitted tightly to the body by a band of shirring which runs down the front from the high neckline and fastens with tiny, taffeta-covered buttons. A frilly collar in white organza, edged with a narrow band of lace, edges the high neck and forms a jabot at the front of the waist. This frill is continued as an edging to the small hip pockets on the skirt.

A full length coat of black broadcloth accompanied this suit. It is made with a rounded collar of silver fox fur and a fitted and belted waistline. The broadcloth coat has long, tight sleeves which are slightly elevated at the shoulders. For cocktail wear, the black broadcloth skirt is discarded in favor of an ankle length skirt of black taffeta which is made along the same lines as the taffeta blouse. The band of shirring, outlined by small buttons, continues down the center front of the skirt almost to the knees. From this point the skirt flares out and dips almost to the floor in back.

O'Neal, district chairman of International affairs, president of South Pasadena Woman's Club and for four years Federation representative to the Institute of World Affairs held in Riverside, was the speaker at the meeting of Torrance Woman's Club at the clubhouse, 1422 Engracia avenue, Wednesday afternoon.

She gave an interesting review of knowledge gleaned about world affairs from authoritative sources. She reviewed the forms of government in the various countries noting the changes made by each and the cause that lay in the back of the change. Mrs. O'Neal especially dwelt on the promise of Russia to have a constitution and give to the people a bill of rights. Prior to Hitler's reign in Germany, she stated there were 35 different forms of German government. Germany is a firm believer in civil service, not so much now as in past years but enough to redeem herself and if she so desires, to take her place among nations. Mrs. O'Neal praised President Roosevelt for the stand he has taken in regard to gold stored in America.

France has made a good move recently, according to the speaker, because she has attempted to negotiate with Germany, perhaps England will do the same and this will help peace to reign in Europe. In speaking of alliances between the various countries of the world, Mrs. O'Neal stated "they are like icebergs, only their best points are visible."

Tea Follows Program
Mrs. Pearl Morris of Hollywood, who writes as a hobby upon "Points in Writing," she closed her talk with several well chosen poems. Mrs. Morris plans to leave on a world tour in early March.

Another luncheon guest was Mrs. John Burrows, president of the Daughters of the Golden West. It being Americanization month, Lillian Barrington, at the request of the American Legion Auxiliary to Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170, read the flag code and instructed club members in proper respect to the flag.

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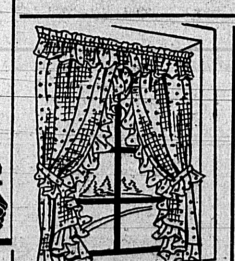
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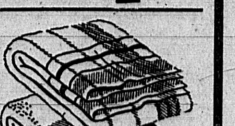
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
