Harbor Board's Annual Report Full of Data

Containing a wealth of illustrations and detailed statistical, physical and economical information the latest annual report of the Los Angeles Harbor Department is just off the press, according to announcement today by Mayor Frank L. Shaw. Included in the volume are a history of the port, description of the port's facilities, detailed information about the new 12,500-foot breakwater extension, chapters on United States government facilities and the navy, a discussion of port commerce, a summary of industrial development for the year, transportation facilities, descriptions of major cargoes such as petroleum, cotton, citrus fruits, and reports on engineering, construction, maintenance, finance and statistics.

Illustrations in the volume cover a wide range from aerial views of the entire harbor and its various segments to wharf and cargo scenes and views of new construction.
Reports of the Los Angeles Harbor department, according to port authorities throughout the country, are among the best of public documents and, Mayor Shaw declared, the latest report of this department is no exception.
