

'STINGY' CAR VISITS CITY

Chevrolet Winner of Famed Economy Run On Tour

One of the nation's "stingiest" cars made its appearance here yesterday with the arrival of the Chevrolet sedan which captured first place in its class in the world famous Gilmore-Yosemite Economy Run last month. The trophy-winning car was driven here by Jack Hull of the Gilmore Oil company, who was one of the officials who assisted in handling the details of the recent mileage classic, and was put on display in the showrooms of Ed Thompson, local Chevrolet dealer.

"We've been looking forward eagerly to seeing the car that made such a fine record in the Gilmore mileage test," said Thompson. "Of course it's no different in any respect than any current Chevrolet sedan because American Automobile Association rules for the mileage event specified that every car in the run were literally torn apart by A. A. A. technicians to be sure every entrant complied to the rigid stock specifications."

Like the other 23 cars entered in the Gilmore-Yosemite Run, the Chevrolet had to make two climbs to over 4,000 feet, battle icy grades, blizzards and snow on the 352 miles between Los Angeles and Yosemite National Park. Despite the handicaps imposed, the sedan achieved the remarkable record of 41.8 ton miles per gallon of Red Lion gasoline to win first place in its price class.

Open Building Bids Next Monday Night

Next Monday night the city council will again open bids on the proposed administrative building to be constructed adjoining the civic auditorium on El Prado. The first set of quotations were thrown out early in January when the prices were held too high.

The council learned Tuesday night from City Auditor C. J. Rambo that PWA authorities in Washington have again approved the federal allocation of about \$5,500 toward the cost of the building. In accordance with their request, the council adopted a resolution unconditionally rescinding the PWA grant toward the proposed new fire station, plans for which have been discarded by the city.

"Owl-Eye" Buttons Placed On Streets

"Street Owls" are now guiding night traffic at Torrance boulevard and Maple avenue and soon they will be leading their "eyes" at Hawthorne and Sepulveda, at the end of the parkway on Torrance boulevard, and at Carson and Madrona streets.

The "street owls" are the reflector buttons set in pavement at regular intervals to direct motorists at night. They are being installed by Street Commissioner William Gascoigne.

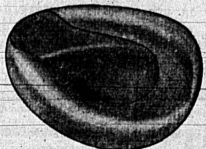

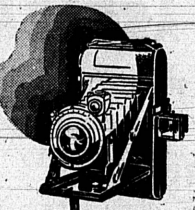
