**White Point Outfall Sewer Section Near Finish**  
Work was nearing completion this week on the submerged section of the White Point Outfall sewer, with March 1 as the scheduled completion date, weather permitting, according to A. K. Warren, chief engineer of the county sanitation districts.

Lining of the tunnel section through the Palos Verdes Hills has been delayed slightly due to heavy rains that flowed into the seven-foot bore at some of the points. Excavation for the 31,000-foot tunnel section was completed last fall, and the United Concrete company, which had the contract for the northerly link, extending from the treatment plant several hundred feet into the hills, completed its work last September.

Warren estimated that the entire project was approximately 75 percent completed.

## Young Pastor Takes Pulpit Here This Week

The addition of two doctors and an attorney to the city's professional group during the past few weeks was followed this week by the increase of a new pastor here. He is Rev. H. W. Ezell, the youngest minister to locate in Torrance.

Rev. Ezell has taken over the pulpit at the Grace Tabernacle on El Prado and is conducting regular services there Sundays at 9:30 a. m. and 11 a. m., and Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 7:30 o'clock. He comes here from a successful evangelistic tour thru Iowa and South Dakota.

The new pastor, his wife and baby son, who was born on St. Valentine's Day, will make their home here. Both Rev. and Mrs. Ezell were trained at Long Beach in ministerial work and are members of the California Evangelical Association. They are accomplished singers and violinists. Next Sunday Rev. Ezell will begin a series of evangelistic meetings that will be held nightly at Grace Tabernacle except Saturdays for two weeks.
