## Meatless Dishes That Win Favor

Left to our own devices during Lent we're quite likely to fall back too often upon a few old favorite recipes that soon get dull. Now that's a pity when the world is full of so many perfectly swell dishes that fit into the scheme of things as they are just now without even half trying. We should really make an effort to find interesting new ways to conform to Lenten customs.

Take this recipe for Macaroni and Fish Casserole, for instance. There's a simple dish now that will introduce a nice bit of variety in your meals and still keep well within the letter of the law. To make it, just pour hot water over a small can of tuna fish to drain the oil, and flake the fish into small pieces. Then place the fish in a buttered casserole, along with a 17 ounce can of cooked macaroni in cream sauce with cheese and 1/2 cupful of cooked peas, and stir gently with a fork.

For a crisp topping scatter over the macaroni 1/2 cupful of rice or corn flakes that have already been tossed in a teaspoonful of melted butter. Then pop the casserole into a moderate oven (375° F.) to bake for 25 minutes.

## Congressman Colder at the Capitol

The propaganda campaign in the defense of the Supreme Court and in opposition to the President's program is swelling the mails of every member of Congress. It has not yet reached the proportions of the Ohio flood—but it is very threatening. I want to refer to just two.

One is printed in a very fine grade of heavy bond paper which is embellished with stripes of red and blue. At the head is an engraving of the Ark of the Covenant. It begins with a sort of Holy of Holies atmosphere and the first paragraph ends with this statement: "but is sacred, like the Ark of the Covenant of God, which no man could touch and live." Then follows another engraving of an Egyptian tomb, followed by a warning of ancient priests and sacred writings. In other words, the originator of this remarkable piece of propaganda gives the impression that the Constitution and the Supreme Court are untouchable and must be bowed down to, and ends with the solemn warning—"God Watches."

In contrast to this very beautiful piece of printed propaganda is a letter which has reached me from California. It says: "Permit me to protest very strongly against leading U. S. Supreme Court with any New Deal riffraff. Are you a Congressman or a yess-man? You fellows seem to be just as unbalanced as the President. Is it true that all new dealers are not in possession of all their marbles? Looks like it. Congressional monkey swinging on Roosevelt stick."

**PRO AND CON . . .**  
Much of the propaganda received against the President comes from partisans who have bitterly fought the President in the past. This is particularly true of the newspaper campaign now being conducted at full blast. A great many lawyers, who have idle moments, are now occupying themselves in pouring out their pent up energies in behalf of the Court and denouncing the President. Since most lawyers are subservient to judges and to courts, this is to be expected.

Labor organizations and the farmers are beginning to warm up and support the President. Since the Supreme Court in its decision has rendered useless the measures passed by Congress in behalf of labor, shorter hours, better wages, collective bargaining, and against child labor, and has deprived the farmer of a plan which would give him the same benefits as have been enjoyed by industry, these will probably rally to the support of the President.

Then the important TVA and other government power projects are also involved. It is stated that more than 50 injunctions have been secured in Federal courts throughout the country to prevent municipalities from securing the ownership of their electric light and power. The President's program has aroused the bitter antagonism of the power trusts and the big holding companies, which spent \$5,000,000 to defeat the President's program to bring the big power companies under control.

**CANDY FOR BABY . . .**  
The House passed a bill for the retirement of the Judges of the Supreme Court. The real purpose of the retirement bill for the Supreme Judges is a

sort of "candy for the baby" proposition. "Since you will not resign, Mr. Judge, will you please retire on full pay and work part time and give the President an opportunity of introducing some new blood in the Supreme Court?" says the House.

Wisely or unwisely, the framers of the Constitution provided that Judges of the Supreme and Federal Courts shall hold their offices during good behavior, and since most of them behave very well, according to the average standard of citizenship, they enjoy a life time position. Not only that, but the Constitution provides that the compensation for Judges shall not be diminished during their term of office. This constitutional provision is one of the reasons why the Supreme and other Federal Judges refuse to pay an income tax.

**POLITICS ACTIVE . . .**  
California politics are getting hot in Washington. A delegation from Los Angeles county appeared in Washington a few days ago for the purpose of persuading J. F. T. O'Connor, comptroller of the currency, to become the Democratic candidate for Governor of California in 1938. O'Connor occupies a very important position in the financial affairs of the nation. He is a close friend of President Roosevelt, James A. Farley, and other influential men in Washington. From the standpoint of experience and good judgment, O'Connor ranks very high in Washington.

Other candidates mentioned here in Washington are: John F. Doekweiler of Los Angeles, John J. McGrath of San Mateo, and Frank H. Buck of Vacaville. All three members of Congress have good records. I am only mentioning the possible candidates from Washington. No doubt there are many other candidates at home who are under consideration.

**BIG JOBS AHEAD . . .**  
The way the President keeps piling up work before Congress looks like we may be here until Christmas. Some of his proposals will give some of the talkative members of Congress an opportunity to exhaust themselves, and members of Congress hold world records on their ability to talk, and to continue a wagging tongue marathon. Among the proposals submitted by the Chief Executive is a reorganization of Executive departments. That is a big subject and will probably take considerable time.

Then his proposal for conservation, control of floods, dams, development of power is another big subject and will require a great deal of study and time. The farm tenancy program to provide a method by which farm tenants may become the owners of farms, is another new departure and will likewise require much work in the Committee and much time on the floor. A new program of crop insurance for the farmers is another wide subject. Then there is talk of a revision of the Social Security law; and the biggest question of all is a proposal to revise and reform Federal Courts.

**QUERY FOR CRITICS . . .**  
I wish some of the critics of the President's program, instead of assailing the President would explain to me how does the President's program violate the Constitution? If Congress passes such a bill, how does Congress violate the Constitution? Also, where in the Constitution does the Supreme Court get its authority to override Congress and the Executive department?

Furthermore, was it the intention of the framers of the Constitution to establish three coordinating branches of government—the legislative, the executive, the judiciary; or was it their intention to place the final powers of the legislative and executive departments in the Supreme Court, that holds a position for life and which in no way is responsive to the wishes of the electorate of the country?

**WHO'S GOING . . .**  
Anybody want to attend a \$100 banquet? A Democratic Victory Dinner will be held March 4 to celebrate the President's first inauguration. You will not get \$100 in winning and dining, for \$95 of it goes to the Democratic National committee to help balance the Democratic budget. Campaigns are expensive, so this \$100 dinner is for the purpose of wiping out the deficit. I do not plan to attend, but if anybody wants a ticket, just let me know, but don't forget to inclose the \$100. Keep in line and don't crowd.
