He assured dealers that new orders for Chevrolets will receive immediate attention and that deliveries will be made with the utmost rapidity.

"It is a source of deep gratification to me and to everyone in Chevrolet to notice the fine spirit of co-operation exhibited by the public," Holler declared.

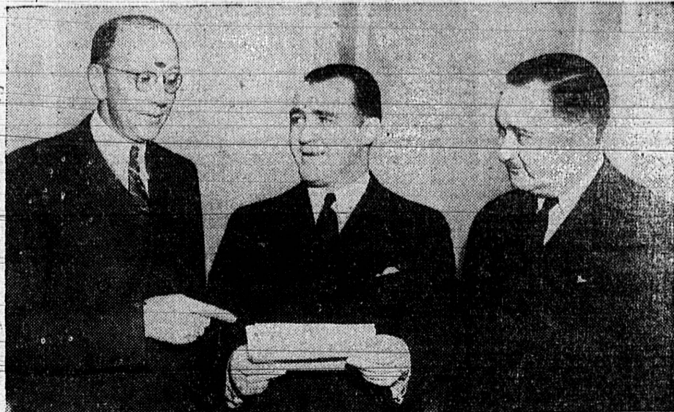
"We have received hundreds of letters here in Detroit from customers assuring us their willingness to take delivery as soon as we could obtain the materials which would permit us to resume production.

Return to Peak
"Production now has been resumed, and shipments of new cars will shortly be under way. We expect to be producing at capacity within a few days in order to reward the loyalty and patience of the public with deliveries of new cars with all the speed of which we are capable."

Holler pointed out that in November and December Chevrolet enjoyed two of the most successful months in its history, producing and delivering more than 200,000 of the new 1937 models. New sales records have been consistently set up ever since the announcement of the new models last November, the sales chief recalled.

"We will bend every effort toward returning to a high peak of business as quickly as possible," Holler declared. "In the meantime, the many thousands of orders from Chevrolet customers, which we have not been able to fill during the recent stoppage of production, will be filled as soon as normality can be restored to the assembly lines."

Palos Verdes Soil Conserving Work Will be Surveyed

The agricultural extension service of the University of California, co-operating with the soil conservation service of the United States department of agriculture, will sponsor a tour of inspection of the Palos Verdes demonstration project, Friday, Mar. 12.

This project contains some 15,000 acres of land where extremely severe losses of topsoil have occurred in past years because of uncontrolled erosion forces. During the past two years considerable work has been accomplished under the supervision of the soil conservation service in the large scale application of special cultivation practices, engineering construction and cropping programs.

The "hysteria of speed" which has afflicted both the motoring public and the motor car manufacturers is apparently passing," according to J. R. Davis, shown above with Los Angeles Ford executives, who continued:

We account for this by reason of the more sensible buying habits of the 1937 motor car shopper. In the Ford '60' they get a top speed of 70 miles an hour—enough for any reasonable demands—exceptional gasoline economy and all the safety features which Ford has pioneered in the low priced field."

Davis revealed some interesting sales statistics which prove the really outstanding sales of the Ford Motor Company.

For instance, the Ford world production for last year was upward of 1,225,000. A lot of cars! In December Ford produced 107,000 units, an increase of about 25 percent over production for the same month a year ago.

Today Ford plants are producing 6,400 a day—and still are not able to keep pace with the demand.
