For years he owned the Harbor City Tomato cannery and his tomato paste became a recognized superior product in the east and abroad. At the time of his death he was part-owner in the business.

Then he became clerk of the court at Santa Fe, New Mexico, then a typical southwest cattle town. He went to Montana to become registrar and receiver in the land office at Kalispell. Mr. Goshorn purchased a weekly newspaper there that became The Daily Interlake under his direction as editor and publisher. He was a member of the Knight Templars of the Masonic lodge.

About six years ago he sold out his interest and came to California, locating at Lomita. He was survived by a daughter, Mrs. Mildred Vaughn of that community and four grandchildren, Robert Vaughn of Catalina, Mary Alice, Joe and Eleanor Vaughn of Lomita.
