Benny is under the care at Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital.

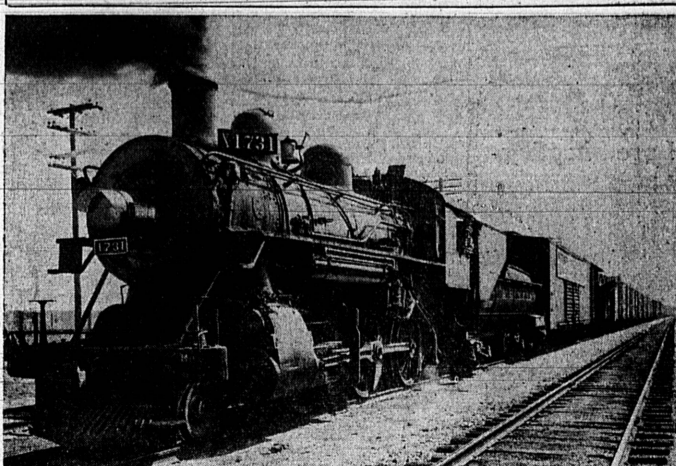
Enforce Uniforms . . . To make it more compulsory for the girls to wear uniforms, a new system was started last Monday.

Hyde Advises No Accounting System Change

In view of proposed amendments to the Unemployment Reserve Act, Carl L. Hyde, of Torrance, executive director of the unemployment reserves commission, advises California employers not to undertake extensive revisions of their accounting systems.

"Until the state legislature has acted on a series of amendments which are now under consideration," Hyde said, "it will not be advisable for employers to reorganize their accounting systems in an extensive manner. The amendments may change the system of bookkeeping and reporting necessary under the law to keep the commission advised of the employer pay roll."

"Forms are provided by the unemployment reserves commission for reporting to the fund, and until the legislature acts, it is not anticipated that further requests will be made of employers."
