Famed Gridder's Death Saddens Friends Here

The tragic death—his automobile crashed into a railroad viaduct pillar in South Chicago—of John J. O'Brien, assistant football coach at Notre Dame University, last Friday brought sorrow to this city altho he had never been here.

Johnny O'Brien's brother Hugh works for the General Petroleum refinery in North Torrance and the grid star had several personal friends here who knew him from his Los Angeles high school days. It is believed that he had fallen asleep at the wheel of his car.

His mother, widow, and four brothers reside in Los Angeles and the famed athlete is also survived by three sisters. After graduating from Notre Dame, O'Brien served as assistant coach at Annapolis for two years and was head coach at St. Edwards College in Texas before returning to his alma mater in the role of assistant coach to Elmer Layden.

He visited his home city of Los Angeles last fall when he came there in advance of the Notre Dame team to scout Southern California in its game with U. C. L. A. O'Brien played his last collegiate game in Los Angeles in 1930 when, as a regular end of the Irish eleven, he played one of the leading roles in the 27-0 victory over Southern California. This was Rockne's last game, too, as the late coach was killed in an airplane wreck a few months later.

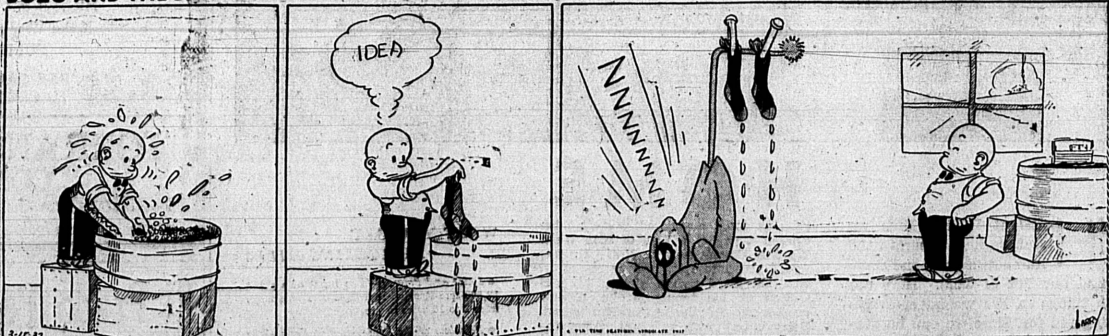
