Poppy chairmen from each of the 24 units in the district are supervising the preparations in their own particular group. Velora Murphy is serving as chairman for the Bert S. Crossland unit with Maxine Smith in charge of the music.

Local Unit Honored
There will be no admission charge. Since this affair marks the 20th year since the United States entered the World war, an overflow attendance is expected. PARIS. (U.P.)—Captain Molyneux made the clothes worn by the well-known French actress, Gabrielle Dorziat, in her latest play "La Femme d'un Autre Age".

The play calls for two sports costumes—one is a sleeveless tulle dress in white crepe and the other, white plique-shorts. The tennis dress has an untrimmed square neck, a gored skirt to insure fullness, and a scarf slash of yellow tulle printed in blue dots. The shorts are a one-piece sleeveless and backless costume in white, worn with a long, transparent skirt of bright red fringe.

Mlle. Dorziat wears a tailored street suit of navy blue wool made with a very short and fitted jacket that fastens with two big buttons. The blouse is of white grosgrain and ties at the high neck in a big bow. She wears white gloves and carries a silver fox scarf.

In one act she appears in a trailing chiffon tea gown in a multicolored flower print. The gown is fitted to below the hips, then flows out in three full tiers that are stitched down. The flowing sleeves are tiered similarly and the gown is worn over a slim foundation of black satin. The foundation is sleeveless with a low cut décolleté which is revealed thru the transparent flowered chiffon.

Her evening gown is of pale blue satin made like a slim fitting sheath from the high, trimmed halter neck to the hem. It is worn with a sheer coat of black tulle which is fitted to the hips then flares out in three wide flounces. The three-quarter length sleeves likewise end in a flounce.
