Bears Resume Games With Win Over Islanders

Only sensational fielding on the part of Joe Ely, Bear first baseman, kept the local club out of trouble.

Both pitchers, Molinar (Bears) and Flores (Delmas) served the whole long game which was a sensational pitching duel. Molinar struck out 10 Delmas and Flores whiffed seven Bears. The latter collected 13 hits to the Islanders' eight. The Bears met the Todd Clothiers of Long Beach next Sunday at the Columbia Steel diamond here. Hamilton, second baseman, poked out a three-base hit to tie the score. Then Ray Olsen, playing his first game with the Merchants in the field, drove in the winning run that gave the Lomitans their fourth title by a score of 6 to 5.

It was these two bingles, Patalano's steady pitching and a fighting, never-give-up spirit that won the championship for Manager Walt Morris' club. The whole team deserves the plaudits of local fans for its stellar performance—the Lomitans made but one error—and its bright enthusiasm was characteristic of the club.

S. Venable looked exceptionally well at first base and Patalano bagged three hits in addition to his mound work. The Merchants' pitcher, B. Davis, of the stove team for 13 hits, while the G. and S. squad collected 11. Patalano, who substituted for Lefty Grant when Grant arrived from Catalina Island too late to start, struck out five and did not allow a single walk. Davis walked two Lomitans and whiffed six.

Grant, who was slated to do the hurling for the Morris-men, was delayed by throwing and hitting practice by the Chicago Cubs. He will go east with that club. Frank League, another Merchant stalwart, leaves today for Bisbee, Ariz. He will be greatly missed as his hustle and pep kept the Lomitans fighting all the time. Morris has two good catchers lined up but he does not know just which one will be out next Sunday.

The Sunset Marines will furnish the opposition for the Lomita team here next Sunday. On April 11, the Richfield Oilers will play here and in three weeks the Maxwell All-Stars are slated to perform.




