

# Zamperini-Mounday Mile Race Features Compton Meet Tomorrow

## TARTAR JAYSEE AND U.S.C. FROSH EVENT BACKGROUND FOR MILERS' CLASSIC

Herschel Smith's powerful Compton Junior College track and field team will face an equally strong University of Southern California freshman cinderpath squad in a dual meet at Compton tomorrow afternoon, 2:30 o'clock.

The Trojans are reputed as having the greatest set of freshmen track athletes in history and will be slight favorites over the Tartars.

The feature race of the meet will be waged in the mile, with Louis Zamperini, the ex-Torrance high school champ and Olympic runner, matching strides with Seward Mounday of Compton.

It will mark the first time that the pair have run against each other since 1934, when Louis Zamperini led a fleet set of prep mile stars to a new world interscholastic record in the state prep finals in the Los Angeles Coliseum. Zamperini ran 4:21.2 and Mounday was timed under 4:25.0. Mounday is the present holder of the Southern California jaysee record of 4:27.4.

Fast races and close competition are anticipated in virtually every event. The Frosh strength in the shot and discus events along with well-balanced power in the other events, are expected to have a slight edge on the Comptonites.

## Bowling Series Nearing Close

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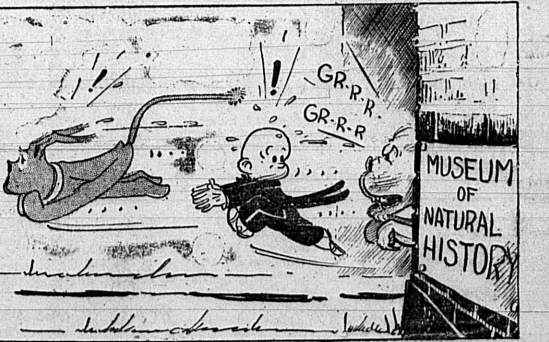
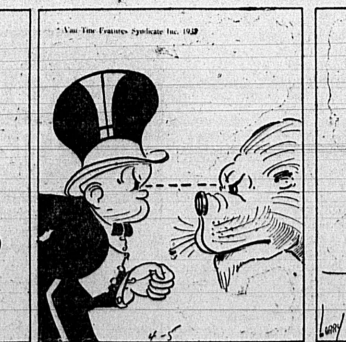


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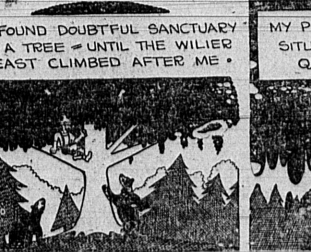
