PARIS (U.P.)—One of Molyneux's outstanding evening gowns of iridescent pearl satin has been ordered by Princess Nicholas of Greece, mother of the Duchess of Kent. The gown is made with a full skirt sewn in slight gathers on the bodice at the low waistline. It is made with a low cut decollete, back and front, and the Princess wears it with one of her own beautiful tiaras.

Another Molyneux favorite is the long sheath-like evening gown of black crepe which is fitted closely to the body and trimmed with pale bluish hyacinths at the waist. The gown is worn under a long cape of the same black crepe trimmed with luxurious skins of silver fox fur. The silver fox comes about the neck and continues all down the front openings of the cape while two other skins are twisted from front to back to make the armholes of the cape.

The very full evening silhouette has proved as popular as the slim one and Molyneux makes several evening gowns of lace which is wired out to form an old-fashioned hoop skirt. Taffeta is wired for stiff, full skirts. One gown in black lace is made with a slender fitted bodice and a big bouffant skirt that is wired. The lace is sheer and transparent and reveals a narrow fitted foundation of shiny black satin.

Roman striped material is used over and over again for evening clothes in Paris. Eight or ten different colors are combined in stripes of varying widths with the stripes usually running about the body on the bodice, while the skirts are made with the stripes running up and down.

Nat'l Business, Professional Leader Cites Statistics on Comparative Salaries

Josephine Hollebaugh, research chairman for the Los Angeles District Business and Professional Women's clubs, insists that women are not taking men's jobs away from them and comes forth with points to prove her statements. Speaking at the district convention held in the Miramar hotel in Santa Monica, Saturday, Miss Hollebaugh stated that less than one percent of the women earn more than \$5,000 per year. In this group the women are experts in their field; men also qualified for the work are rarely unemployed because of the small supply of such experts.

"One and four-tenths percent earned between \$4,000 and \$5,000," she said, and in this group 71.4 percent could be replaced by men, but only 11 percent received salaries. The remainder worked on commissions.

Three and five-tenths percent earned between \$3,000 and \$4,000 and only one-third of these jobs could be attractive to men and only 11 percent were salaried jobs.

Twenty-nine and four-tenths percent earned between \$2,000 and \$3,000 per year. Twenty

percent of these positions could have been filled by men, but only 10.60 percent were salaried, Miss Hollebaugh declared. Sixty-five percent earned less than \$2,000 and nine percent of these had commission jobs. Men might have filled 21 percent of these positions.

Forty-five percent of all women employed are supporting from one to five dependents.

Miss Hollebaugh based her conclusions on statistics taken during 1936. Margaret Holcomb of Los Angeles was elected president of the district, succeeding Georgia Shropshire of Alhambra. Bess Stewart was elected vice-president-at-large by one vote after Mildred Zeilhoefer had been nominated from the floor. Pearl Hoots was elected treasurer; Ruth Spencer, secretary; and Ethel M. Roseland, auditor. Members of the Torrance National Business and Professional club to vote at the convention were Addie Parks, Dollie Hoxie and Bettina Miller.

British Styles Reflect Hues of Coronation

LONDON, April 15 (U.P.)—The coronation influence dominates current British fashions from the correct lipstick shade and the set of millady's curls to the cut of her evening gown and the color of her bathing suit. Variations of red, blue and gold are the popular colors, with a few greens and purples for variety. Black is almost forgotten.

Coronation red is the leader, a red with a rich blue depth. The favored blue is softer than royal and lighter than navy—a perfect accompaniment to the red and seen often in its company. The gold is a light shade which tones with coronation blue. The green is very light, almost sea-green, and blends with both the gold and the blue. Royal purple carries in its wake the softer tones of lilac, orchid and violet.

Cloth of gold and cloth of silver are natural choices. The coronation also has inspired renewed use of gold and silver embroidery and braiding, as well as ermine trimming. One spectacular use of the precious metals is in bathing suits. A Lancashire factory is turning out suits of cloth of gold and cloth of silver, guaranteed not to rust and which cling to the figure like oiled silk.
