Congressman Colden at the Capitol

WASHINGTON, April 15.— (Special to The Herald)—Congress has a sort of cleaning day occasionally.



The liveliest day in the House occurred when the Dickstein and Dies resolutions were brought up for discussion. All members were on the toes, a large number were on their feet, yelling to obtain the attention of the speaker and the air was sizzling.

Dickstein, chairman of the committee on immigration and naturalization, introduced a resolution asking for the appointment of another committee for the investigation of Nazis, Fascists and Communists. The opposition was hot and furious. In the last Congress Dickstein secured the passage of a similar resolution and \$30,000 was expended by the committee.

Some bills were introduced in the House curbing the so-called unpatriotic activities in this country, but the discussion developed that these bills were sleeping in committees. It was the opinion of the House that Dickstein and his committee should get busy and get some action, and that there was no necessity for squandering any more money on investigations.

FUR FLIES . . .

The Dies resolution provided for an investigation of the sit-down strikers. The House was aroused to a fighting mood by the report of the rules committee, which gave each side—Democrats and Republicans—30 minutes each. Somebody discovered that only about five minutes on each side were allotted to those who opposed the Dies investigation, so the fur began to fly and the resolution was overwhelmingly defeated.

If the leaders who apportioned the time had been fair to opponents, and if the resolution itself had provided for investigation of dishonest methods of manipulators of stock in big business, collusion of manufacturers in monopolistic combines and invasion of labor unions by hired snipers, results might have been different, but the resolution was interpreted by a majority of members as a one-sided affair.

The House investigating committees have not been an outstanding success. On the other hand, the Senate has been very successful. Senator Black has exposed a number of big business rackets; Senator Nye has unearthed volumes of interesting material on war munitions' unsavory record; LaFollette's committee exposed the employment of Pinkertons in labor

unions; Senator Wheeler of Montana has made a splendid contribution in investigation of railroads, and the late Senator Fletcher of Florida unearthed a mass of incriminating evidence against bankers and stock exchanges.

The House investigating committee, headed by Congressman Sabath of Chicago, has exposed swindling methods of real estate bond operators, and has made the best record of the House investigating committees.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Questions and Answers

Q. May the two witnesses required if an employer's tax totals less than \$10, be employees?

A. Employees may not act as witnesses on Form SS-1.

Q. Does percentage of partnership ownership mean anything in determining whether one partner is an employee and the other an employer?

A. Percentage has no effect on the question. If an actual partnership agreement or contract exists all partners are employers regardless of the amount of interest each might own.

Q. How do I report the case of an employee who reaches the age of 65 in my employ?

A. Form SS-3 is used to report such cases. The report is made for the month in which the employee reaches that age. This form is also used to report the death of any employee. Form SS-3 is issued by and filed with the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Q. I am a waitress. I receive \$16 per week, one meal a day, and whatever tips I am given. Are the meals part of my salary? Are the tips part of my salary?

A. The meals you receive are part of your salary and the tax you and your employer pay is figured on the fair value of each meal. Your tips are part of your salary only if you have to account for them to your employer. If you are free to keep the tips without an accounting or a record submitted they are not considered wages and are not taxable.

Q. Can I pay my Social Security tax for the entire year in case I know exactly what my payroll will be?

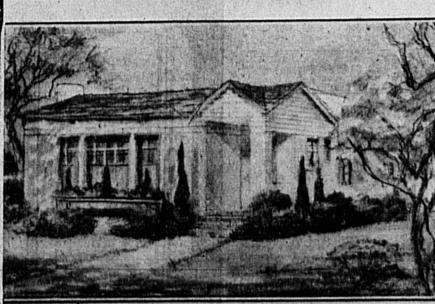
A. You have to file returns and pay taxes under Title 8 each month for the month preceding. You may not file yearly under this title. Title 9, covering the Unemployment Insurance provisions of the Act requires yearly filing.
