No More Trips

Kelley Clan Plagued by Jinx When Journey is Planned

As much as he likes to visit friends and relatives in his old home state of Ohio, F. C. Kelley of 1522 Amapola avenue, is determined never to go back there again. Not that he is superstitious but there seems to be a jinx hanging over the Kelley clan which lets mishaps fall on the members every time the local residents plan a trip east.

When Mrs. George Hesse, sister of Mrs. Kelley, slipped and broke her ankle in falling from her nephew, Guy Kelley's front door step following a farewell dinner party in her honor last Tuesday, F. C. Kelley vowed that he and his wife would not plan any more journeys to the old home state. The accident to Mrs. Hesse, who was to leave shortly with the Kelleys for the east after a visit here, was the fourth trip misfortune to dog the Kelley clan as the Torrance residents were either preparing to leave for Ohio, or were enroute there. Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Kelley

came to California 26 years ago. After six years in the Southland they planned to return to Ohio for a visit. Just before they started, Franz Kelley, brother of F. C., was killed in an accident at a Kelley oil well in Long Beach.

Two years later they started east again and Kelley's sister suddenly passed away in Ohio state while the Torrance couple were enroute. In 1933, as they were returning from an eastern trip, a son-in-law was critically injured in Santa Barbara. Only a miracle of surgical skill saved his life.

On New Year's Day this year, two days before they were to have departed for Ohio, Mr. and Mrs. Kelley were involved in an automobile accident near Long Beach. Mrs. Kelley was seriously injured and spent two weeks in a hospital.

Then last Tuesday occurred the accident to Mrs. Hesse. The Kelleys are thru planning trips to Ohio.
