Two years later they started east again and Kelley's sister suddenly passed away in Ohlo state while the Torrance couple were enroute. In 1933, as they were returning from an eastern trip, a son-in-law was critically injured in Santa Barbara. Only a miracle of surgical skill saved his life.

On New Year's Day this year, two days before they were to have departed for Ohlo, Mr. and Mrs. Kelley were involved in an automobile accident near Long Beach. Mrs. Kelley was seriously injured and spent two weeks in a hospital.
