In releasing this promise of economy in city government exclusively to the community press, Mayor Shaw pointed out that early adoption of his city-county consolidation program would save city taxpayers nearly \$9,000,000 annually, almost half of the total city budget now estimated at \$18,850,000.

Departmental heads asked Mayor Shaw for \$29,945,704, according to figures released this week. The mayor asserted that he will shave this to a minimum of \$19,000,000.

## MAYOR SHAW TO SHAVE L. A. BUDGET 33 PERCENT

Determined to slash at least \$10,000,000 from the city's new 1937-38 budget, Mayor Frank L.

Shaw this week requested departmental heads to meet with him Monday, prepared to prune their departmental recommendations at least 33 percent.

"City taxes will not go up," said Shaw, "and if possible we intend to cut the tax rate. This can be done without curtailing public services which this city, alone in the nation, has for years been able to give its citizens and at the same time reduce taxes."

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## Moore Seeks Probation for Morals Charge

When Edgar J. Moore, 61-year-old bookkeeper formerly employed by a local automobile agency, was brought before Superior court in Los Angeles late last week, he again pleaded guilty to a morals charge involving a 10-year-old girl. He had previously admitted his guilt at preliminary hearing before City Judge Robert Lessing April 5.

Moore, who has been held in the county jail since he was taken there following the Torrance court hearing, will appear for sentence May 5. It is understood that he has applied for probation. Both Judge Lessing and Police Chief G. M. Calder said this week that they would not recommend leniency in the case.

## Old-Age Pension for Teachers Misses Ballot

To place before voters a proposal to provide an old age pension for school teachers and other employees, the Los Angeles board of education will either hold a special election or wait for another municipal election after May 4, it was indicated this week.

The last opportunity for putting the proposition on the May 4 ballot was lost last Friday when the city council failed to meet through lack of quorum, and so perforce could not act on the pension resolution passed by the board of education.

Pointing out that the employees of a governmental subdivision are not given the protection afforded citizens under the National Security Act, the school board in its resolution, proposed establishing a plan for a district retirement salary under provisions of the state school code.

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## HEADS OILMEN

## Citizens School Group Backs 4 Candidates

Names to conjure with, but not men to trifling with, when they become members of the Board of Education, are those borne by John F. Dalton, for many years president of the Los Angeles Typographical Union; Dr. E. Vincent Askey, secretary of the Los Angeles Medical Society; Lawrence L. Larrabee, former president of the Los Angeles Bar Association, and Clarence W. Pierce, treasurer of Pierce Brothers. Those men propose to put the Board of Education on a sound business basis and administer the great public school system efficiently and honestly, according to their sponsors, the Citizens School Committee.

They are out to defeat for reelection, George W. McDill and Stewart O. Mertz, incumbents, who make up the remainder of the group known as the "Four Horsemen." In addition to these incumbents, the committee also insists upon the defeat, again of Robert H. Kee, who aspired to the office in 1935, under the Epic banner, backed by the "Four Horsemen" aggregation.
