Determined to slash at least \$10,000,000 from the city's new 1937-38 budget, Mayor Frank L.

Shaw this week requested departmental lieads to meet with him Monday, prepared to prune their departmental recommendations at least 33 percent.

"City taxes will not go up," said Shaw, "and if possible we intend to cut the tax rate. This can be done without curtailing public services which this city, alone in the nation, has for years been able to give its citizens and at the same time reduce taxes."

In releasing this promise of In releasing this promise of economy in city government exclusively to the community press, Mayor Shaw pointed out that early adoption of his city-county consolidation program would save city taxpayers nearly \$9,000,000 annually, almost half of the total city budget now estimated at \$18,850,000.
