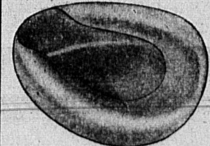

Participation of all Southern California in "Harbor Day", Saturday, May 15, is being invited by letters to schools, colleges, service clubs, chambers of commerce, and industries all over the southland. Preparations for a colorful program embracing ship, industry and dock open house, games and contests at various points in the nation's second port and many other special events will provide a spectacular outing for the 100,000 visitors according to General Chairman Donald F. Smith of the sponsoring Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce. An unannounced motion picture star will be crowned "Queen of the Harbor" on board a motion picture studio's 17th Century slave ship, to be moored at the foot of Avalon boulevard, Wilmington. For the first time, Long Beach will join the observance this year. Special games, boat races, and exhibitions are being prepared by the beach city.
