Road District Tax Levy May be Revived Next Year

Reinstatement of the super-visorial road district tax levy probably will be effected next fiscal year by the board of supervisors, it was learned this week as budget hearings on the 1937-38 salary budget neared a close at the Hall of Records. Criticism of officials of a number of cities throughout the county has resulted in the decision on the part of at least two of the supervisors that the road levy should be levied. No road district tax has been levied for the past two years. This tax applies only to the unincorporated area of the county, and applies on all property not included within the limits of incorporated cities. It is for the maintenance and repair of unpaved roads, culverts and guard fences. Since no road district tax was levied for 1935-36 and 1936-37, property owners in unincorporated areas paid nothing for up-

keep of unpaved streets, while virtually every city levied a specific tax for the upkeep and repair of its streets. Both the cities and the unincorporated areas gained from various allocations of gasoline tax by the supervisors, however.

The road district tax levy has never been more than 10 cents since 1930. The three years prior to that it was 20 cents, and before that it was 25 cents and on up to as high as 60 cents, from 1911 to 1901.

A 10-cent levy produces approximately \$250,000 at the county's present assessed valuation of slightly under \$2,500,000,000.
