6 cups cold water
Method: Measure dry beans, wash thoroughly and mix well with salt, sugar and molasses. Add water and meat. Cook in thrift cooker on low heat 8 to 12 hours or longer.
1 pound beans—4 cups water.
4 pounds beans—11 cups water.

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PRACTICAL HEALTH HINTS Your Need For Calcium

RECENTLY the newspapers carried a description of a circus giant who is said to be eight feet tall and seven inches wide. The fact that this young man is the world's tallest person is interesting, but a certain feature of his diet is even more significant. "I drink milk every day," he told a reporter.

Why he consumes this food, he answered that he did so because a professor had advised him to drink milk daily in order to get plenty of calcium. Besides, he added, he liked it.

Milk helps to support the massive frame of this young giant, as well as the skeletons of all growing persons because it is our best food source of the minerals, the lime salts or calcium phosphates, that are needed to build strong bones and sound teeth.

The Calcium in Milk
A quart of pasteurized or certified milk contains slightly more than one gram, or a little over one fortieth of an ounce, of calcium. The body requires a little less than a gram of this mineral every day.

Milk, however, is not the only excellent food source of calcium. A quart of a pound of cheese contains just as much of this mineral as a quart of milk. Without milk or cheese, or both, in the daily diet, it is difficult to get enough of the necessary lime salts. There is some excellent calcium in green leafy vegetables, egg yolk, nuts, and whole wheat, but the lime in milk and dairy products is used by the body to better advantage than when obtained from vegetables and other foods.

Most persons do not get enough calcium. A recent investigation of 4,000 patients in a leading New York hospital showed that in practically all instances, the diets were too low in this necessary mineral. Not only is calcium necessary for the growth and development of the young, and for the protection of expectant and nursing mothers, but it is required by all adults who desire the best of health.

Not only is calcium needed to build bones and preserve the teeth, but it aids in nourishing the body, and promotes general well-being.

Narbonne Extension Looms As Debt Limit Report Is Ordered

Preparation of a debt limit report was ordered this week by the board of supervisors, as the next step in opening Narbonne avenue from its present terminus south of Redondo-Wilmington road southerly to the Palos Verdes hills.

A petition just filed by property owners was found to contain the signatures of 73 percent of the area owners, and 65 percent of the street frontage owners who desire the street to be put through. The supervisors recently informed A. P. Weber of Lomita that such a petition could be considered if it was found to contain 65 percent of the signatures.

Curbs and gutters and a four-inch sidewalk are the only permanent improvements sought, and the cost is given as \$7,200 in the engineer's estimate. Assessed valuation of the district to be assessed is given as \$37,080, and the cost would be 24 cents per front foot.
