Pete Zamperini Fetes His U. S. C. Mentors

PERHAPS this story should go on the society pages of The Herald but because it reports a gathering that was confined to just two subjects—a delicious Italian dinner and a good old-fashioned talk-fest about sports—I think I ought to grab it off for my pillar.

Monday night Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Zamperini turned their home over to son Pete and his friends. It was Pete's 22nd birthday but the natal observance was cast into the background to permit that graduate-to-be of U. S. C. to pay tribute to those who have helped him the most during his university career.

Present were Track Coach Dean Cromwell; Business Managers Leo Adams and "Pop" Foster; Eddy Leahy, assistant track coach; A. B. Crane and his son, Clark, who is the Trojans' star 220-yard sprinter; Louis K. Gough, graduate manager at U. S. C.; Attorney Kenneth Hughes of this city; Host Pete; Mr. Zamperini, and two correspondents.

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Pete is graduating within the next few weeks after a brilliant career at U. S. C. The fact that he is only 22 years old makes this milestone all the more important. His brother, Louis, could not be present because Louis is "boning up" on his studies preparatory to his final exam of his Freshman year at the Trojan institution.

High Average Needed To Win Speed Dash

AN average of 113 miles an hour will be necessary to win the 500-mile race at Indianapolis Motor Speedway this year, drivers and mechanics are predicting in reports from Indianapolis.

With a good break on weather, they anticipate the most favorable speed conditions in the 25-year history of the annual Memorial Day event. The race will be held May 31 this year. The track has been smoothed, turns made safer and there is no limit on the amount of gasoline used. Last year there was a limit of 37½ gallons for the 500 miles. Only restriction this year is that standard gasoline obtainable at any public filling station be used.

Present record for the 500 miles is 109.069 miles an hour, set by Lou De Meyer, Huntington Park, California, last year when he became the only three-time winner of the race. It represented an increase of three miles an hour over the old record despite the fuel limit and an accident which slowed down the race for about 35 miles.

"Wild Bill" Cummings, Indianapolis, winner of the 1934 race with an average of 104.865, won pole position with a new record of 123.445 miles an hour for the 25-mile qualifying run.

Slight Cut In Power Rates Will Be Effective Here June 1

Slightly lower electric rates for household and commercial customers of the Southern California Edison company in Torrance and other cities throughout the county are to become effective June 1, it was announced this week.

Domestic customers will receive 70 percent, or \$456,000 of the reduction, and commercial users will receive \$203,000, according to the California Railroad Commission. The reduction will be scarcely noticeable on the average bill, but is a step toward lower rates, engineers said.

The new rates represent an honest attempt on the part of the Railroad Commission to simplify schedules and make it possible for a greater number of customers to qualify under cheaper electric charges," engineers said. The reduction was described as "larger than the amount recently predicted," further study by Commission engineers having revealed the increased amount would be necessary as an initial step to equalize the reduction in rates throughout the company's far-flung system.

This week's reductions brings the total announced by the Commission within recent weeks to more than \$2,000,000 a year for Southern California customers of public utility concerns. The lower rates are being used as selling points for new electric ranges and water heaters, however, and the reductions will be made up in other ways, it was understood.

Emergency action to regulate the use of the frontage of Hawthorne boulevard between the north city limits of Torrance and the south city limits of Inglewood was taken this week by the board of supervisors.

According to Supervisor Leonard Ford of the Fourth district, there are too many second-hand stores seeking locations on the boulevard in the Hawthorne district. Inglewood will not permit the businesses in that number on Hawthorne within the Inglewood city limits, and the result is that they are "bunched" in the Hawthorne section. The Regional Planning commission was instructed to take steps to zone it immediately.

Paxman to Get City Globe Trade

During the coming fiscal year Paxman's hardware store will supply the city with electric globes, it was learned at city council meeting Tuesday night when a resolution of intention to enter into a contract with General Electric corporation was adopted.

The light globe business is alternated yearly among local hardware firms and amounts to "not less than \$600." The city, it was revealed, gets a 25 percent discount under the contract.

Second-Hand Stores On Hawthorne Will Be Zoned Out

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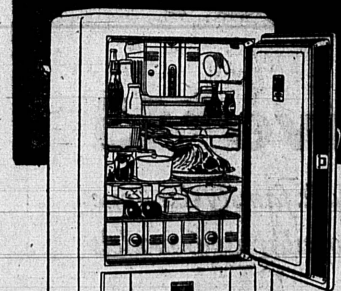
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
