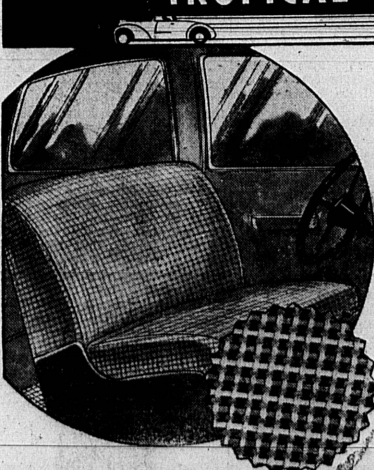

AQUATIC STARS BACK NAT'L BOOSTER SHOW

AN annual National Aquatic Show, designed to stimulate national interest in swimming and offer another competitive event for swimmers and divers aspiring to positions on the United States Olympic team, will be inaugurated at Los Angeles June 5 and 6.

The show, sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, will be held at Los Angeles Olympic swimming stadium, the big concrete pool built for the Olympic Games of 1932. The project already has been approved by the Amateur Athletic Union.

Under the direction of Harry Pierson, Olympic coach and general show manager, a series of five competitive events will be held, along with a pentathlon, water polo contests, and eight special features that include everything from bathing beauty reviews to a log rolling contest.

TOP PERFORMERS ARE INVITED

EVERY outstanding swimmer and diver in amateur ranks has been invited to participate in his specialty, and at least a dozen of the 1936 Olympic team have indicated their intentions to compete. Marjorie Gestring, three-time springboard diving champion; Katherine Rawls, American Olympic star; Adolph Kiefer, holder of all world backstroke records; Ruth Jump, national senior high-diving champion; Frank Kurtz, American Olympic national high-diving champion of 1932 and 1936; and Buster Crabbe, only American to win a swimming event in the 1932 games, already have signed to appear.

All preliminary heats for the races will be held before the show opens. Only finals will be staged during the two-day program. Races scheduled are the 50-meter free style, 100-meter backstroke, 100-meter breaststroke, and 100-meter free style. Dives will be of front, back, jack-knife and free varieties.

COMEDY DIVING INTERLUDE

In the water polo game, the American Olympic team will meet the strongest challenger. Other events are canoe tilting, comedy diving, formation swimming, a fashion revue, and others.

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Torrance B Team Places Third in Finals; Narbonne B's Win

By scoring 51 points, six more than they were expected to collect, the Leuzinger high school track and field team captured the Marine League championship Friday in a meet held on Leuzinger's home field. San Pedro tallied 45 points for second place and Gardena with 29 5-6 was third. El Segundo unexpectedly came thru to take fourth place with 22. Narbonne was fifth with 18½ and the Torrance Tartars brought up the rear with 13 tallies.

The race for the title was between Leuzinger and San Pedro but no one anticipated that El Segundo's Oilers, who had not won a dual meet all season, would break into fourth position ahead of Narbonne and Torrance. Failure of the Tartars to take expected points in the dashes contributed to Leuzinger's total and assisted that team in beating San Pedro.

Narbonne's flashy Class B team walked away with the honors in that division with 80½ points. El Segundo was a weak second with 36½ and the other schools finished in this order: Torrance, 16 1-6; San Pedro, 14½; tie for fifth between Leuzinger and Gardena, 8½ each.

Tartar Efforts Listed
Leuzinger's Class C squad made it a double win by taking that division's relay event to nose out the Narbonne team, 39½ to 35. San Pedro was third with 27. Torrance fourth with 16; El Segundo scored 10½ and Gardena seven.
